7. Description

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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Designed in a Chateausque style with Romanesque elements, the Auburn Public Library is constructed of brick with granite and copper trim. The main section, which is two stories high, is rectangular with a steeply pitched gable roof. The main (south) facade is divided into three sections. Comprising the east half of this elevation are three arcaded entrances. Each doorway is surmounted by a Gothic arch fashioned in stone. Symmetrically aligned above each opening is a pedimented wall dormer with ornate copper cresting.

A large polygonal ell projects out from the west side of this facade. Large round arched windows with granite trim and a hipped roof with a finial distinguish this wing from the main section of the library. In the center between the entrances and the ell is an octagonal stair tower with a conical roof and a copper finial.

The east and west elevations have windows with flat arched lintels on the first story and banks of round arched windows on the second story. Granite is used for the belt courses and the coping of each gable end. Attached to the north side of the building is a two-story brick addition with simple, square headed windows.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Auburn Public Library is a fascinating architectural statement of great sophistication which sets it apart from the other buildings on Court Street and has firmly established it as a prominent city landmark. It was designed by William R. Miller, a highly creative Portland architect.

Founded in 1890 as a subscription library, it received \$1,000.00 from the City of Auburn in 1895 upon condition that it become a free library to all Auburn citizens. Early in 1903 the city council agreed to accept \$25,000.00 from Andrew Carnegie for a new library building on condition that the city provide the lot and agree to provide funds for the support of the library.

William R. Miller designed many important buildings in Maine including the Lawrence Library in Fairfield and the L. C. Bates Museum at the Hinckley School, both of which are listed on the National Register.
