Set upon the crown of a three-creptwell landscaped grassy knoll at the intersection of Main Street and Maple Avenue, the Merriam Home is the most prominent landmark in a predominately residential section of Newton which consists of numerous Victorian and early twentieth-century houses. It consists of three buildings:

- 1. The main house (1883), a two-story High Victorian wood frame building, to which is connected at the rear (east) a three-story frame addition (1902).
- 2. The carriage house (1883), of character similar to and separately located at the north of the main house.
- 3. A two-story cottage, also wood frame Victorian, located to the northeast, at a lower level along Maple Avenue.

The main house, built as the residence of a wealthy manufacturer, is little altered from its original condition. It is of complex plan and facade, with clapboard siding, steep intricately-patterned hipped slate roofs, numerous gabled dormers, balconies, porches and other protrusions. It is large in scale, with high ceilings. There is much "gingerbread", including panelled designs applied to gables and fascias, eave brackets and cut out scrollwork.

The principal elevation (west) is traversed by a large onestory wood porch, connecting an octagonal tower at the southwest corner with an elaborate carriage entrance at the northwest corner. The tower forms the dominant element, with its porches and balconies and its tall pyramidal spire. The carriage entrance is also roofed by a pyramid, which encloses an unusual room on the second floor.

Windows are generally double hung, of extreme vertical proportions; many are glazed with intricate colored glass.

The exterior has been little altered, with the exception of the rear (east), where a two-story glazed room has been added and a narrow hallway constructed as a connection to the 1902 addition. A large greenhouse at the south no longer exists except for its masonry foundation. A decorative cast iron fence bounds the west side of the property along Main Street.

The interior of the main house is highly decorated in Victorian style, with varnished wood trim, wallpaper, and parquet floors. There are seven major fireplaces, of intricate design and with majolica tile surrounds. The open main stair is monumental and the dominant interior feature. Many items of original furnishing remain.

An outstanding example of High Victorian residential building, in excellent condition and situated on a large, well-landscaped site, the Merriam Home is a significant and commanding landmark in Newton, New Jersey, a town which is rapidly losing many of its excellent Victorian buildings.

From 1883 to 1900 it played an important part in the life of the town, as the residence of one of the town's most affluent manufacturers, Henry W. Merriam, whose two large shoe factory buildings still stand in Newton. Upon Mr. Merriam's death in 1900 it became a home for retired Presbyterian ministers and as such has served the community until the present time. It is contemplated by the present ownership that it will be sold at the end of 1970; the Sussex County Society for the Preservation of Historic Landmarks plans to acquire the property for use as a civic, social and cultural center.

Its significance is local and regional in that it is a well-known and prominent Victorian Mansion and is the dominant building in an area which was developed largely in the Victorian period.
