# Item No. 8.A. Description of Site (Cont.)

8.A. The south (principal) and west elevations of the building are of commercial style with suggestions of Richardsonian Romanesque. The first floor storefronts are vitreolite and metal applied over the original storefronts and around the first floor display windows. The second and third floors of the front facade have two cream brick towers flanking a central red brick recessed bay. The tower motif continues on the west facade with two recessed bays and three towers. The corner tower is common to both facades. The towers have two stilted arches running two stories and surrounding windows except for the northwest tower with one stilted arch. The fenestration is a mixture of nine-over-nine and three-over-nine wood frame double-hung windows.

On the front (south) facade the windows have stone sills and segmented brick jack arch lintels. The sills in the recessed central bay run clear across the bay. There are contrasting brick decorative panels above the second and third story windows of the central bay and small decorative brick panels above the arches in the towers.

On the west facade, the cream colored brick towers are identical to those on the front facade except that the north tower has only one stilted arch. The recessed bay to the south is of red brick and roughly twice the width of the recessed bay in the front facade. The decorative detailing of the two is identical.

The recessed bay farthest to the north in the west facade is of cream brick. It has six arched windows on the second floor divided into two groups of three windows and seven rectangular windows on the third floor. The second story windows have an applied metal molding at the sill under each set of three windows. The third floor windows have a continuous stone sill course across the recessed bay. The contrasting brick decorative panels are the same on the west facade as those on the south, or front, facade. Rising above the roofline is a glass and wire skylight, now covered with tar paper painted with aluminum paint. This skylight once lighted the Odd Fellows meeting room on the third floor.

The four towers which once rose above the roofline have been altered by the removal of approximately three feet of projecting wall and pyramidal roofs.

# 36. Information sources/References(Cont.)

The Odd Fellows' meeting hall furnished accommodations for most of the important social and civic groups in the city in the last decades of the nineteenth century. The meeting rooms were used for three Odd Fellows' lodges and the Daughters of Rebekah, as well as for lodges of the Ancient Order of United Workmen, the Knights of the Maccabees, the Order of Foresters. the G.A.R., 5 and the Royal Arcanum. 6

The Odd Fellows'Block also furnished space for the organizational meeting of the Scandia Society, a Norwegian literary society, in 1893, and for the Grand Forks public library association for several years before the Carnegie library was built in 1903. The building also served as the post office for several years before the Federal Building was erected in 1906.

Over the years, many businessmen have conducted operations from the Odd Fellows'Block. The first floor offices facing Kittson were originally assigned for and occupied by the E.J. Lander investment company. E.J. Lander and Company remained in the Odd Fellows Block from 1890 to 1899 when the firm moved to their present quarters on DeMers Avenue.  $^{10}$  The basement of the building housed printing equipment for the periodical Progressive Observer from 1906-1916.  $^{11}$ 

# 37. Reason for significance (Cont.)

This building today serves as a crucial anchor on the west for the historic part of downtown Grand Forks situated as it is at the corner of Fourth Street and Kittson Avenue. Its removal would detract from the historic character of the two streetscapes. The area west and south of the Odd Fellows' Block has been razed and rebuilt with newer structures in the past fifteen years. The Odd Fellows' Block marks the southwest corner of the historic area of the downtown today. It is significant for its architecture and historical associations with the early social life of the city.
