This house is significant for its architecture and its association with the exploration and settlement of the Bergen County, New Jersey area. It is a reasonably well preserved example of the Form/Plan Type as shown and more fully described herein. As such, it is included in the Thematic Nomination to the National Register of Historic Places for the Early Stone Houses of Bergen County, New Jersey.


Peter Haring bought 236 acres here in 1721 and sold to his son Abraham on December 18, 1738. He left it to his son Peter, who married Catharina Blauvelt on April 21, 1757 and probably built the house then. He was a Judge of Common Pleas from 1779 to 1791 and died on July 15, 1807. In 1819 the house and 144 acres were sold to Henry Vervalen. His granddaughter, Eliza Haring, inherited the property and she and her husband stayed on the farm until 1880.
