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### Description

Liberty Arming the Patriot (1897) is a dynamically composed bronze figure group, portraying a young male farmer dressed in realistic work clothes and a female figure. The woman stands on a rocky prominence; she wears classical robes, a breastplate, sandals, and billowing cloak. The face is impassive; on her head is the Phrygian cap which identifies her as the embodiment of freedom. She holds a pike in her right hand, a sword in her left. The farmer is bare-headed, dressed in a yoked shirt with rolled sleeves and work trousers tucked into rough boots. He is shown turning from his plow (his left hand still rests on the plowhandle) to take up the sword held by the female figure with the right hand. He steps toward the other figure on his left foot. The figure group is 11' high and 5' wide and deep.

The group is set at the center of a wide, stepped, grey granite base, whose sides curve forward; the base is large, 22' wide, 10' high, and 9' deep. At the center of the base is a large square bronze plaque depicting in shallow relief a Union artillery battery, representing the men led by General Ambrose Burnside at Antietam Bridge; smaller triangular plaques on either side depict female figures, one of whom inscribes a tablet, described as Epic Poetry or History; the other, Eternity, contemplates a fern frond. On the rear of the base is a text plaque, identifying the work as a memorial to Pawtucket citizens who served in the Civil War: IN GRATEFUL RECOGNITION/of the valiant and self-sacrificing service to their country/of all persons/who went from Pawtucket and its vicinity to join/the forces of the United States during the Civil War, /and especially to the memory of those who suffered/And died in that service, /this monument is erected by /THE LADIES' SOLDIERS' MEMORIAL ASSOCIATION of Pawtucket, Rhode Island, /and by them is consecrated as an everlasting/memorial/anno domine 1897. Bronze lamps were once set on the low ends of the base; these are now missing, but they are documented in photographs.

Aside from the missing lamp standards, the monument is in good condition. There is some corrosion and staining of the bronze figure group, but this is minor.

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### Significance

Liberty (sometimes Freedom) Arming the Patriot (1897) is historically significant because it documents the principal effort of Pawtucket to honor those who served in the Civil War; because it is associated with a major fabricator of bronze sculptures, the Gorham Manufacturing Company; and because it is a good representative of the character of early twentieth century figurative sculpture.

Liberty Arming the Patriot was raised by the Ladies' Soldiers' Memorial Association, a local group formed to honor Pawtucket's Civil War veterans. They conducted an 11-year campaign of donations, public subscriptions, and entertainments to raise funds. The memorial was cast at the Gorham Manufacturing Company plant in Providence.

Compared with many other Civil War memorials in Rhode Island which depict stiff figures in military dress, Liberty Arming the Patriot is innovative in form and shares some of the characteristics of the leading sculpture of its day. The sculpture uses the posture and detailing of the two figures to create an active composition, a decisive moment caught in time forever in the metal. The sculpture depicts an ancient theme, the young man called from civil life to serve the nation in time of need, and transforms the theme into a contemporary allegory. The dynamism and activity of the sculpture is characteristic of the best sculpture of the turn of the century. Even the form of the base, with its stepped arms extending out and forward from the statue, reaching a crescendo at the sculpture group, adds to the lively drama of the composition.

W. Granville Hastings was born in London and studied at King's College and Lambeth Art School. He worked in Paris under Jules Dalou and, in 1892, was hired by the Gorham Company to work principally on the exhibits at the World's Fair.

Though commemorative in intent, <u>Liberty</u> has also achieved historical significance, by the quality of its design, by its association with the Gorham Company, and as its community's

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principal effort to honor its Civil War heroes.
