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Setting and Location

Madison National Bank is located at 157 Main Street in the heart of the business district of Madison, Boone County, West Virginia. The building faces east along Main Street while the Little Coal River and the Chesapeake & Ohio Railway Company right-of-way run along the west, or rear, elevation of the building. This nomination includes one contributing building and no outbuildings.

Description

Exterior

The Madison National Bank Building was designed in the Beaux Arts style and constructed in 1918 by Huntington firm, J.J. West and Company. It is a three-story, rectangular, brick building with a symmetrical limestone façade. The building has a flat roof and parapet. Several skylights are on the roof allowing natural light into the building.

The building is dominated by a three-story, multi-light, arched window opening flanked on either side by Corinthian pilasters. A row of acanthus leaves decorates the area between the first and second stories while a row of even recessed crosses adorns the area between the second and third stories. Above a centrally located double door is a decorative escutcheon, or shield, centered above a plain classical frieze. The cornice line upon which the escutcheon is set exhibits a row of dentils.

The main elevation is topped by a large, dentiled cornice with a frieze upon which is emblazoned the words, "Madison National Bank." At either end of the frieze are decorative floral panels. Floral decoration is also exhibited in the triangular areas above the arched window. The side elevation of the building, facing an alley, is asymmetrical and displays several metal, multi-light casement windows with stone sills including six 12-foot arched windows. Some windows are replacements.

Interior

The building is entered through a small foyer with plaster walls with white marble wainscot, black marble baseboard, and a pink marble floor. A doorway to the right opens into a small room with a stairway to the mezzanine floor, third floor, and also to the basement. The foyer has a second set of double replacement doors that lead into the main lobby. The doors are surrounded by multi-light windows designed to allow natural light into the main lobby. Upon entering, the entrance is topped by a large decorative cornice with brackets.

The attention to natural lighting in the building is through a series of large windows, light-wells, skylights, transom windows, and a pedestrian alley along the south side of the building. The two story main lobby features an ornate plaster ceiling, six twelve-foot high windows and six skylights. An enclosed staircase in the rear of the lobby leads to a small balcony on the second

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floor overlooking the main lobby. The third floor has a long hall along the south elevation with doors and transoms leading to a series of office and storage space along the north elevation.

The external modifications to the bank include the addition of a rear, enclosed fire escape; a bank night depository slot in the front façade, which is currently used as an after-hours book drop by the library, roof repair and new windows on the third floor side walls. The structure underwent moderate internal modifications in 1974 after being donated to the Library Commission. These modifications were prepared by R.L. Wilson and J.D. King, Architects, of St. Albans, West Virginia. Claude Erps, Contractor of Bluefield, West Virginia installed the windows on the third floor, re-glazed the skylights and painted the interior in 1998 and in 2005 updated the heating and cleaned and refurbished the basement.

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Statement of Significance

The Madison National Bank is and eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places under *Criterion A: Commerce* for its local significance in Madison's commercial history and *Criterion C: Architecture* as an excellent example of the Beaux Arts style of architecture in southern West Virginia. The period of significance begins in 1918, the year of construction, and ends in 1957, the National Register's 50-year cut-off date. The building continued service as a bank until 1966.

Brief History

With the anticipation of the arrival of the railroad in the early twentieth century and the anticipated reopening of the coal-fields, there was an expressed interest for a sound financial institution. The Madison National Bank was established and chartered as the first bank in Boone County on November 28, 1902 to provide the banking needs of the community and its surrounding area. Founders included Julian Hill (President), F.C. Leftwich (Vice President), Sid Croft (Cashier), Cecil Croft, J.M. Hopkins, Sam Bradley, and Doutin Stillings.

Madison National Bank first operated in a one-room store in downtown Madison until 1906 when it moved to a two-story concrete block building. The bank moved to the Madison National Bank Building in at 157 Main Street in 1918 when the building was constructed.

On May 31, 1929 Madison National Bank merged with Boone County Bank, originally chartered on December 17, 1907 and became Boone National Bank. Consolidation created added stability to the continuance of banking in Boone County. The first board of directors of the new bank were H.G. Shaffer, F.C. Leftwich, H.W.B. Mullins, W.H. Turley, S.E. Bradley, C.R. Mitchell, E.C. Knabb, E.E. White, D.B. Stollings, O.C. Chambers, M.A. Byrnside, G.B. Hensley, Henry Keadle, Dell Hill, and C.H. Nelson.

Around the same time, Boone National Bank began renting out space in the building. C&P Telephone Company began operating their switchboards on the third floor of the building and vacated in 1966 with the addition of a new dialing system. Boone National Bank remained in the Madison National Bank Building until September 1964 when it moved to a building on the corner of Josephine Avenue and State Street to better accommodate their clients. After the bank moved, the building remained largely vacant for ten years until it was donated to the State Library Commission for use as a public library.

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Criterion A: Commerce

Madison National Bank is significant to Madison's and Boone County's commercial history for its contribution to the banking industry in the community and the county. It is the oldest bank in Boone County and has served area residents for over 100 years.

The bank was chartered at a time when the coal industry in the area, nearly defunct for half a century, was about to be revived with the coming of the rail road. The bank continued service to the community throughout the Great Depression and even continued after the heyday of the coal industry in the county.

Criterion C: Architecture

The bank is also significant for its Beaux Arts style of architecture, a style not common in the area. The Beaux Arts style was introduced to the United States in the late nineteenth century by architects who studies at the Ecole des Beaux Arts in France. The style became a symbol of the City Beautiful movement, a turn-of-the-century reform movement in architecture and urban planning that used beautification and monumental grandeur to counteract the perceived moral decay of poverty-stricken urban centers.

Elements of the style portrayed in the Madison National Bank building include bilateral symmetry, smooth masonry walls, large columns flanking the entrance, and grand, round-arched openings. The bank is an excellent example of the Beaux Arts style and as a popular style of architecture interpreted for a small community in southern West Virginia.

Summary

The Madison National Bank is significant to the local community for its contributions to Madison's and Boone County's commercial history throughout the first half of the twentieth century. It also serves as an excellent local example of Beaux Arts architecture.

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Verbal Boundary Description

"Beginning at a stake on Main Street in said Town at a point 97.5 feet from the S. E. corner of Lot No. 22 of the original plat of said town, thence with said Main Street N. 39' E. 53 feet to a stake in Lot No. 2, thence running parallel with the line of said lot at 20 feet and 7 inches there from N. 61' W. 97.5 feet to a stake at 33 feet from the center line of the Coal River Railroad, thence running with said right of way 53.2 feet to a stake, thence 29' W. 96.2 feet to the Beginning, together with the buildings thereon, which are to be held and used as hereinafter set forth."

Boundary Justification

The National Register boundary includes the entire parcel of property originally associated with the Madison National Bank building when constructed in 1918.
