

Describe present and historic physical appearance: Summary

The Gould Jones Reservoir was built in 1946 utilizing the materials of concrete and brick. It is located just off of Arkansas Highway 7 on the grounds of the Newton County Library. The purpose of the structure was for the supply of public water to the town of Jasper in Newton County. Although the reservoir is currently not in use, the structure is in good condition, and the library plans to make some slight alterations to the structure in order to use it as a storage area. The library also plans to use the reservoir as an educational tool as a part of their programs.

Elaboration

The Gould Jones Reservoir was constructed out of poured concrete and brick by Gould Jones in 1946. The round structure was created out of poured concrete with a band of red brick at the top. The reservoir is capped by a concrete conical roof with a very shallow pitch. The roof contains a access door at the west side and a ventilation area at the roof peak. This ventilation area is crowned with a truck wheel rim which is said to have been placed there by the builder as a similar wheel rim is incorporated into the structure of a nearby church which was also built by Jones. The reservoir is said to have had a one cylinder motor pump at the time of construction.

The Gould Jones Reservoir sits on the same property as the new Newton County Library with was built approximately two years ago. The library plans to incorporate the reservoir into its educational and cultural programs, with landscaping proposed by the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville's School of Architecture. The library plans minimal changes to the structure in concert with the new landscaping: painting the concrete a neutral color, cleaning the brick, and putting a plexi-glass cover over the access hole on the roof. A door will be cut into the reservoir on the side that is blind to State Highway 7 with a grill at the bottom for ventilation. A metal cap will be built over the peak of the roof over the truck wheel rim to aid in ventilation for the structure. The library plans to use the reservoir for storage, and as an educational tool for the community.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above:

Summary

The Gould Jones Reservoir is being nominated under Criterion A with local significance due to its importance as the first source of public water in the town of Jasper, the county seat for one of the most undeveloped counties in the state. The reservior is also being nominated under Criterion C with local significance as a good example of this type of structure in Newton County. Jones was known locally as a maverick builder, having completed at least a half-dozen buildings in Jasper that exhibit unique rock work and which are still standing.

Historical Background

Cultural Affiliation: N/A

Architect/Builder: Gould Jones

One of the earliest settlements of the Ozark Mountains, Jasper was plotted in 1842. A hundred years later, REA delivered electricity to its residents in 1941. A year or so later, Gould Jones built the first water reservoir in Jasper which provided water for the only factory which has ever done business in this town-- a tomato factory, which provided precious \$2.50 a day jobs to about thirty women who peeled tomatoes, and to many farmers and tomato "haulers." The current reservoir replaced a smaller reservoir which was also built by Gould Jones.

The canning factory was closed by the Arkansas Department of Health. According to one resident, the factory "ruined our wells, with tomato juice found in them." According to Gilbert Jencks, Gould Jones replaced the original reservoir with a larger one in 1946, providing "a big service for the community." It was the first water system to Jasper residents, to whom the structure and service was a "novelty." Guy Bennett, who moved to Jasper on Halloween of 1938 and hauled tomatoes from farms to the canning factory in 1945 and 1946, thinks that the

current reservoir was used both by the factory and by local residents, reasoning that the factory required the larger, current tank. Bennet was employed by Jones in the 1940s to haul rocks from the Buffalo River (now a National Park), for Gould's many building projects. County Sheriff from 1959 to 1965, Bennet says that "Gould Jones could do anything with steel, a fork and an anvil," He adds that Jones "figured how to make the top of the reservoir rounded, when everyone told him he couldn't do it, that he'd have to settle for a flat roof." Bennet notes that the pump Jones built for the reservoir was a "one-lunger, cylinder type."

After 1952, when State Highway 7 was finally paved past the Reservoir south to Pelsor, water was provided to residents by the Arkansas Soil & Water Conservation program from other sources, but the reservoir has remained a local landmark and symbol of mountaineering ingenuity since that time.

Two years ago, the property on which the reservoir sits was developed as the site of the Newton County Library, and plans are currently in place to incorporate the reservoir into educational and cultural landscaping, proposed by the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville's School of Architecture. The reservoir will function symbolically as a "Reservoir of Goodwill" for a community that prides itself in its many traditions of goodwill, the best-known of which may be to wave as residents pass each other on any of the roads within Newton County, regardless of their family roots or community affiliations. The structure will also function as a storage building for library landscaping and maintenance equipment.

Locally significant under Criterion A, the Gould Jones Reservoir provided from 1946 to c.1953 (for National Register purposes, the period of significance is 1945-1947) the first public water system in Jasper. It provided water to the only factory to have existed in Jasper, and in turn aided in the development of this community. The Gould Jones Reservoir is also being nominated under Criterion C with local significance as a good example of this type of structure in Newton County. The reservoir exists as a remarkable example of the ingenuity of local craftsmanship, and gives evidence to the versatility of the work of Gould Jones who also completed at least a half-dozen unique rock work buildings in Jasper which are still standing.

- 1-14-97. Anne Courtemanche-Ellis. Guy Bennett, who has lived in Jasper since 1938, remembers the current Reservoir being used both by the canning factory in 1945 and as storage for a residential water system until 1952. Bennet was County Sheriff from 1959 to 1965.





The Gould Jones Reservoir is locally significant under National Register Criterion A in the areas of Community Planning & Development and Engineering. The modest concrete and brick reservoir served as the first "public" source of water in the isolated Ozark mountains community of Jasper, Arkansas. In an isolated and underdeveloped community such as Jasper, which contained limited public infrastructure, the development of a dependable public water source was an important achievement, perhaps matched only by the earlier development of local electrical service by the REA in 1941.


