Description

The E.W. Skinner House was constructed in ca.1898 by E.W. Skinner. The building is constructed in the Colonial Revival architectural style and represents the Builder's Plan Book property type. It retains integrity of overall design, materials, and workmanship. Originally built as a single family dwelling, the E.W. Skinner House is presently utilized as a multiple family dwelling.

The E.W. Skinner House is located in Lot 5, of the Highland subdivision of the Dennis Addition. The Dennis Addition was originally platted in 1883. The building faces north onto East Roosevelt Street. The streetscape along East Roosevelt Street is characterized by modest, working class residences of both historic and contemporary construction. No outbuildings are located on the site.

The original E.W. Skinner House is a square, one-story building of brick construction. The overall building measures 20x30 feet. The truncated hipped roof features a gabled dormer and is covered with asphalt shingles. The original brick walls are sheathed with stucco (ca.1930). The building is supported by a stone foundation.

Exterior features include a shed roofed veranda with square wood posts supported on later brick walls. Original windows have segmental arched openings and are wood double hung sash with single lites. Two off-center entries have original stile and rail doors with glazing. Important architectural elements are limited to boxed eaves with comice molding.

Alterations include a historic period shed roofed addition to the rear of the house, and the application of stucco over the original brick walls. The veranda has been altered with a concrete deck and low brick walls. The house is in good condition.

Statement of Significance

The E. W. Skinner House is significant under Criteria C under the area of significance of Architecture. It is representative of the historic context "Residential Architecture in Phoenix Prior to 1901." Built in ca. 1898 and constructed in the Colonial Revival architectural style, the E. W. Skinner House is representative of the Builder's Plan Book property type. The E. W. Skinner House is also important in the area of Community Planning. As one of only nine nineteenth century buildings remaining in the Dennis Addition, which was originally platted in 1883, the E. W. Skinner House is a rare example of its period and represents the historic context "Nineteenth Century Community Development in Phoenix."

A popular architectural style used during the plan book era was the Colonial Revival style. The use of the style in residential architecture was wide spread in the late nineteenth century. Vernacular adaptations of plan book examples of the style, as demonstrated by the E.W. Skinner House, were once common. The house illustrates a local interpretation of the plan book designs that resulted in a simply detailed building which incorporates the major stylistic concepts of Colonial architecture. With the exception of the stuccoed brick walls, and over roofing with asphalt shingles, the Colonial Revival inspired design of the E.W. Skinner House remains intact. Stylistic features include the common square plan and box massing of the house,

simple hip roof with boxed cornice, typical facade length veranda, and the use of molding and trim in classical shapes.

Built by local contractor E.W. Skinner as his own residence, the house is a specific example of a builder's reliance on plan book designs in local residential construction.
