The gable ends originally had five windows; the street facing gable has a large replacement window at the first story. The exterior is finished with clapboards on all sides. SIGNIFICANCE	The Blackstone House was first recorded on the W.P.A. survey and dated 1735-1750 based on the character of the house and some land record research. Local tradition attributes the house to Capt. John Blackstone and dates it very early eighteenth-century. The house was owned by Blackstones in the nineteenth century. In 1886 the property was purchased and developed into a summer resort by E. M. Hotchkiss of Waterbury. In 1907 the surrounding land was subdivided into building lots. Architecturally, the house is representative of the full two-story central chimney plan New England house as it had evolved by the end of the Second Period, 1690-1720 (Keith). The Blackstone house is significant in Branford's collection of eighteenth-century houses for its integrity of location, design, setting, materials, and workmanship as well as its association with the town's nineteenth-century summer resort history. As an example of eighteenth-century colonial architecture, it meets Criteria C of the National Register of Historic Places.
