DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The William T. Lafferty House is located in Cynthiana, the seat of Harrison County, in a residential area east of the downtown commercial district.

Constructed in the Queen Anne style, the house is three stories high, covered by a truncated pyramidal roof with flared eaves. The main features in this house are a combination of medieval and classic elements, which exemplify the Queen Anne mode.

The most obvious medieval element is the conical-roofed, polygonal turret, which takes in the entire height of the house. The encircling verandah has some classical details, including the main entrance element and the bracketed cornice. The house has a cut-stone foundation, and rough-cut stone belt course and window details. There are hip-roofed dormers and a Palladian window is incorporated into the facade.

Basically a free plan, the house has a main hall with a corner fireplace, flanked by leaded glass windows. The mantlepiece consists of a simple mantle shelf with dentils and two fluted Ionic columns. The freize contains a wreath motif. The main staircase is open with a bead-and-reel molding variation and a panelled wainscot beneath. The hall is lighted by a large oval leaded glass window on the stair landing.

There are sliding doors between the entrance hall and the parlor. A major part of the woodwork in the parlor is burled maple with oak floors and trim. The ornamentation in the parlor consists of a plaster relief medallion surrounding the changelier and leaded glass transoms in the turret windows.

Directly behind the parlor is the dining room which contains the most ornamental woodwork. This room has a four foot wainscot, built-in buffet and an alcove with a fireplace and overmantle. The alcove is arcaded with fluted Ionic columns and panelled pilasters. There are swag motifs located in panels above the arches. The mantle consists of a square opening with a tile surround, colonettes, sunburst motif, beaded consoles, and a flower motif on the frieze. The over mantle is mirrored and also has colonettes. The buffet is flanked by fluted pilasters and has a round arched opening.

The library, located behind the entrance hall, is richly decorated with builtin bookshelves along one wall. The second floor woodwork is simple, but similar to that of the first floor.

The nominated area includes the main house, the front, side, and back yards of the structure which are enclosed by a fence and are important to the visual elements of the house.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This Victorian style house in Cynthiana is significant as being the home of William Thornton Lafferty (1856-1922), the first dean of the University of Kentucky's law school. Built in 1890 for Lafferty, the house exhibits characteristics of the late Victorian period.

W.T. Lafferty was born in Cynthiana, Kentucky, March 1, 1856, one of twelve children. His father, John A. Lafferty, served his native Harrison County as both sheriff and county judge. William Thornton received his formal education from the State University (later the University of Kentucky) and after returning to Cynthiana, studied law under A.H. and J.Q. Ward. He was admitted to the bar in 1879.

Following his admission to the bar, Lafferty established a lucrative law practice in Harrison County. He served as Harrison County attorney from 1882 to 1894 and two terms as county judge. After holding a short term of office as a member of the Kentucky Legis lature in 1900, Lafferty's period of political service ended. He was appointed a trustee of the State University of Kentucky and became secretary and a member of the executive committee.

In 1908 William Lafferty was asked to organize the new law school and serve as the first dean. The early years were difficult, but Lafferty overcame the many problems presented to him. He donated 300 cf his own books to help create the law library, and personally lobbied the Legislature for funds.

Besides his duties as dean, Lafferty received the new title of comptroller, with powers second only to those of the president of the University. His new duties included authorization to audit and settle all school accounts, attorney for the school, supervise the collection and expenditure of funds, location of departments in various buildings, and general oversite of moral standards and maintenance of discipline. In order to be closer to his work, Judge Lafferty officially established his residence in Lexington in 1910.


Judge Lafferty went before the American Bar Association and obtained formal recognition of Kentucky as an accredited law school. The Bar's comment sums up Lafferty's role in the development of the law department. "We now have three Southern states accredited--Virginia with her prestige, Texas with her wealth, and Kentucky with the Judge." William T. Lafferty died on November 9, 1922 and sixteen years later Lafferty Hall, named in his honor, was built to house the law school.

Situated on a major residential street in Cynthiana, the William T. Lafferty House is an impressive Queen Anne structure representing one of Cynthiana's better examples of late nineteenth century domestic architecture. Set back from the road on a large lot, the 2½-story brick building displays the variety of detail and ornamentation which characterizes the Victorian period. In addition, a high quality of craftmanship and creativity is evidenced in the interior treatment.



ADDENDUM

Verbal Boundary Description:

Beginning at the point where the eastern edge of the drive meets Pike Street, the boundary travels east 60 feet along the north edge of Pike Street; then north 120 feet; then west 60 feet; then south 120 feet to return to the point of origin. The house sits in the center of the lot.
