The William Akana or Head Luna's House at 2457 Kolo Road is a single story bungalow with a hipped roof built in 1931. The house was constructed at a cost of \$6285.21 and was the eighth stone house built by the Plantation. The walls are constructed entirely of field stone, while the beams are all of redwood. The plan of the house is of typical bungalow configuration; the living room, dining room, kitchen, and service rooms form one portion of the house, while the bedrooms open off of a corridor in a separate wing.

The original entry was by a curved driveway through the porte cochere. The curved driveway has since been abandoned. The porte cochere joins the front porch, which is made of red colored concrete. The living room is entered from the porch by semi-circular steps through 18-pane French doors.

While the house may be classified as a bungalow, the rooms are exceptionally large. The living room measures  $18' \times 29.5'$  and has a fireplace at the short end. There are  $1" \times 4"$  pine floors throughout the house. The two bathrooms and three bedrooms are reached by a long hallway on the left side of the house. The corridor is entered through an arched opening from the living room. Located behind the living room are the kitchen with adjacent pantry and breakfast room and a generous sized dining room (16' x 18'). This portion of the house is located two steps below the level of the living room.

The head luna's house retains many orignal features. The kitchen and pantry have the original cabinets. They are glass fronted at the top and have the original hardware. The orignal casement windows also remain. These have either 12/12 or

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6/6 panes. The original cranks are wrought iron. The wrought iron curtain rods in the dining room are also thought to be original. Also located throughout the house are the original light sconces. These have a metal base and an alabaster wedge to shield the lightbulb.

To the right of the house is a hip-roofed, stone wall, former garage. This has since been converted into a guest house.

The house sits on a half acre lot. The front yard contains a large shower tree and plumeria, both planted in 1931. There are also established ti, palms, and lehua. Rear yard landscaping includes hibiscus, ti and ginger.

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There was no damage to the house during Hurricane 'Iwa in 1982, so the structure has remained relatively unchanged since its construction in 1931.

The Kilauea Plantation Head Luna's House is significant as an example of the stone construction method employed at the plantation and for its relationship to the history of the Kilauea Sugar Company and its building program. This areas of significance are detailed in the accompanying Multiple Property Nomination Form.

The Head Luna's House is also an important example of an unaltered bungalow from the 1920's/1930's in Hawaii. The house retains its original plan and much of its original hardware. The Head Luna's House is an enlarged version of the typical bungalow plan found in Hawaii. One wing of the house is devoted to the living area and kitchen. A hallway to the side, opening to the living room, leads to the bedrooms. This configuration is found in numerous smaller examples throughout the state. Because the building retains its original porte cochere, windows, and lighting fixtures provides a valuable example of early 1930's design.
