Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The H. L. Kaufman House, built in 1923, is a two-story, detached, rectangular-shaped dwelling with white stucco finish. It has a low-pitched, red-tiled hip roof.

The facade (east side) first floor has a band of four 6/6 double-hung windows and three arched windows to the south of the entryway. The entryway is round arched with glass paneled door and half-round transom. A small red-tiled shed-roofed porch projects out over the entry door. There is a one-story wing with hip roof on the north half of facade, having a band of three 9/9 double-hung windows on all three sides. Second floor of facade has paired windows with iron balconets on south end, three smaller round arched Palladian-style windows in the center, and a band of three triple-hung windows with iron balconets on north end.

First floor of the south side has two lintel-type openings with 9/9 lights toward the west and a one-story porch with red-tiled hip roof covering the remainder of the first floor. The stooped porch has semi-elliptical arched entryway and arcaded opening on west and east. To the east of the entry, there are two semi-elliptical arched openings with multi-paned wood casement windows. The second floor of south side has set of three round arched openings at either end. The larger center window in each set has 12/9 lights and the flanking windows have 9/6 lights. Toward the center is a small, rectangular-shaped opening with twelve lights. It has an iron balconet as do the three windows to the west.

First floor of rear (west side) has one 6/1 double-hung window on either side of a one-story porch. The porch has one round arched opening with glass paneled door and one lintel-type opening. Second floor has one 9/6 double-hung window at corners and two small lintel-type openings in the center. The rear porch has red-tiled shed-type roof.

The first floor of north side has a shed-type, red-tile roof near northeast corner. It has a round arched opening with multi-paned panel door on its east wall. Also on first floor are two 6/1 double-hung windows. The second floor has three 6/6 double-hung windows. There is a rectangular-shaped end wall chimney on north side. The stack is adorned with four circular pots of alternating heights.

Major decorative elements include the low-pitched red tile hip roof and use of red tile on all porches. Round and semi-elliptical arches are used throughout for window and door openings. Also characteristic of the style are the window grilles (rejas), iron balconets, and white stucco finish. Features which capture the eye at roof level are the two chimney stacks, one interior and one end wall. The end wall chimney stack has decorative circular pots and the pierced chimney stack in the central part of the roof is covered with red tile. The dwelling is tastefully landscaped with a variety of shrubs.

Built for an Enid merchant of Spanish/Jewish origin, the property has retained its architectural integrity for 60 years and remains as the best example of Spanish Colonial Revival architecture in Enid, Oklahoma.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The H. L. Kaufman House is architecturally significant because: it is the best remaining example of Spanish Colonial Revival architecture in Enid, Oklahoma.

The property, built in 1923 at the peak of the Spanish Colonial Revival period in America, embodies numerous features of the style. The low-pitched, red tile hip roof, white stucco finish, arched windows, iron balconets, and iron window grilles (rejas) are elements found in the Kaufman House characteristic of the style. There are also several small lintel-type window openings in south and rear walls at the second story level and an arcaded porch (portal) is located on the south side. The molded cornice, red-tiled pierced chimney stack, and end wall chimney with circular pots gives this two-story dwelling a definite Spanish Colonial Revival character.
