Describe present and historic physical appearance.

Fire Station #15 was built c. 1928-1929 as a two-story honey brown brick building with a Renaissance Revival influence. It has a parapet roof highlighted by stone roof caps and with brick capped chimneys. The main facade has a single fire garage opening. There is a large second floor window opening located above the garage door and, it is highlighted by a highly decorative bracketed iron balcony. Highly ornamental vents frame the fire door and front window. There are also two false small iron balconies which adorn the front facade and remain intact. Stone insets further decorate the facade. An arched entrance adorned with brackets also remains intact.

The west facade has a false decorative arched entrance and a series of six vents along the roof line. Six wood framed windows remain on the second floor, and five remain along the first floor. A first floor door also remains. The east facade is nearly identical. Jail bars on the windows also suggest its double-usage as a police station.

#### INTERIOR:

The interior has retained the original first floor garage space which features brick walls throughout, double arched entrances into the rear of the building, and massive wood ceiling beams. The steps leading to the second floor are intact; the second floor plan remains mostly intact with the bathroom, locker, and gathering room areas in place. Original wood floor and window trim remain as do the walls and ceilings. The original fire pole has been removed but the opening remains.

#### **INTEGRITY:**

The exterior and interior of the building has retained its integrity as an early twentieth-century fire station. The exterior is virtually intact except the original second story window on the main facade has been replaced with bronze aluminum, and the original garage door has been replaced.

#### CRITERION C: ARCHITECTURE

Fire Station #15 is architecturally significant for representing a unique blending between the utilitarian urban station with that of the suburban residential location. Fire Station #15 has many of the elements commonly associated with the downtown urban stations, such as: a two-story brick utilitarian building with a flat facade; and its location close to the street without the presence of a lawn. Unlike the other Birmingham fire stations located in a suburban residential area, Fire Station #15 does not have the typical residential form; residential style such as Spanish and Tudor Revival styles; or the residential lawn. Fire Station #15 does have elements of the Renaissance Revival style, a style used on another fire station located downtown (Fire Station #4 - located within the Downtown Birmingham Historic District, NRHP 2-11-82).
