

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#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Liberty Presbyterian Church is a painted brick, Greek Revival church building with hipped roof that is three bays wide and four bays deep and rests upon a plinth that encircles the building. The bays of the church are accentuated on both the front and side elevations by their location within recessed panels. The center-bay entrance of the easterly facade is flanked by recessed panels that are each filled with a second recessed panel rather than a window opening. The center-bay entrance is defined by a pediment supported by paired pilasters, and the molded cornice of the pediment is carried around all elevations of the building. The pedimented entrance bay contains a pedimented doorway with an unmolded surround having three fascias and is filled with double-leaf doors, each having four, fielded and molded panels. The four recessed bays of the southerly side elevation are filled with windows topped with molded cornices. The windows are filled with nine-over-six, double-hung sash and are closed by original shutter blinds. The northerly side elevation is identical except that the easternmost end bay contains a transomed doorway with molded cornice that is filled by an unmolded door with four panels.

The interior of the church is plainly trimmed. The windows have molded architrave surrounds and the deep bases are molded with a single fascia. At the easterly end of the church is the slave gallery with paneled railing that is supported by tapered box columns with molded capitals. Access to the slave gallery is provided by an enclosed stairway which begins with a series of winders and continues in a single straight flight running southerly along the eastern wall to terminate within the gallery. At the westerly end of the church is a slightly raised dais with simple pulpit that appears to be original. The original box-like pews are plain and unmolded.

A two-story brick Sunday school building is attached to the western end of the building to form a T-shaped complex.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Liberty Presbyterian Church is a locally significant example of Greek Revival architecture. This significance is based on the manner in which the grand temple form is employed on a small scale in a church building designed to serve a small community in a rural section of the state. Despite its small size and its simply finished interior, the building exhibits a certain architectural sophistication that distinguishes it from other buildings in Amite County, where the buildings are decidedly vernacular in character. Constructed ca. 1850, the church is the oldest religious structure in Liberty and one of the oldest in the county. The architectural integrity is excellent with the only alteration being in the form of a non-intrusive, rear Sunday school addition. Stylistic similarities suggest that the Liberty Presbyterian Church could possibly have been built by the builder responsible for the construction of the Kingston Methodist Church in neighboring Adams County.
