DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This frame and stone one-and-a-half story structure in two parts faces south in a grove of oak trees on a plateau west of the Susquehanna River southeast of Berkley. It is notable for the exquisitely panelled interior and the unevenly-pitched roof of the frame section, and for the long low east wing.

The larger west section of frame, weatherboarded, is almost square. Now three bays by three, with windows 9 lights over 6, its peaked roof ridge-line runs east-west with a large brick chinmey rising inside the west gable. The south slope of the roof has three sharply peaked dormers over windows 6 lights over 9. The north slope, less steep, extends over a long narrow north room that was once two small rooms. (Upstairs a long dormer now enlarges the north bedroom.)

Restored in 1931 to what was believed to be its condition in 1781, we find now that it had already been altered at the early date from its original shape, and it can be surmised that this change took place, perhaps, as early as 1752.

This frame section contains some very fine woodwork. The living room is fully panelled, with an exceptionally rich molding around the panels. The treatment over the fireplace between the two west windows has raised fielded panels above a handsome late Georgian mantel. A staircase with carved step-ends and a walnut railing rises to the north along the east wall, turns at a landing in the corner, and continues in one more small flight to the second floor. The dining room to the north, has one wall of raised paneling.

A long low wing runs east, one room deep. The first room has stone walls over two feet thick. A central chimney rises from a huge cooking fire-place with its crane still in place behind the wide brick hearth. A winding staircase in the fireplace-wall leads to a small bedroom under the low eaves. Rooms east of this old kitchen were built in 1931 for a modern kitchen and laundry.

Heavy masonry supports in the cellar indicate a larger fireplace than that existing in the living room. This arched support extends across two-thirds of the windowless west wall to the northwest corner of the room. This confirms Henry Chandlee Forman's plan view of the house (see copy of his sketch on continuation sheet #1). This change was made in the late 18th century. The elegant smaller fireplace in the present west wall and the two windows beside it are remembered by our contemporary members of the Jones family who lived in the house in the late 1800's. There seems to have been only moderate wealth among the preceding owners until we go back as far as James Righie in the 1750's, 60's and 70's when the living room was used as a courtroom.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Rigbie House was twice the scene of important events in our country's history. In April 1781 Lafayette's officers quelled a mutiny that might have prevented his army of New England troops, who had been headed homeward, from turning south again to join General Greene and General Washington at Yorktown, in which case that battle might never have been fought. Earlier it had been one of a series of forest outposts fortified against the Indians and representing Lord Baltimore's claim of 1632 to land extending north to the 40th parallel, a claim disputed fifty years later by William Penn (1682) until the Mason Dixon line was set in 1767.

This is the manor house of Philip's Purchase, 2,000 acres willed to Nathan Rigbie by his grandfather Thomas Tench of Annapolis. Rigbie settled here before 1732, having sold off three smaller tracts to Thomas Jones (1728), Gerrold Hopkins (1728) and Henry Coale (1731). He raised tobacco, shipping his crop to England by way of his warehouse at the port of Lapidum. He had a store along the road from Joppa to Bald Friar (probably at the fork of the road to Lapidum at Darlington). In partnership with Jacob Giles and John Hall of Cranberry he built and operated the Cumberland Forge on Deer Creek just above Stafford. And he is believed to have built a gristmill at Wilson's Mill on Deer Creek on a tract called Parker's Chance deeded to his son James in 1743, one of the earliest mills in Harford County. In 1735 he was commissioned Colonel in the Cavalry of Baltimore (now Harford) County, and given the additional responsibility three years later of an appointment as High Sheriff.

James Rigbie, Nathan's eldest son, inherited this property at his father's death in 1752, along with some of his judiciary and military powers. Captain of the Militia and High Sheriff of Baltimore (now Harford) County, he is thought to have built the elegant frame section of the house or perhaps rebuilt the interior using the panelled living room as his courtroom. Here General Lafayette was received in 1781, his troops cooked at the huge fireplace in the old kitchen, their mutiny of that night resolved the next morning.

Owned in later years by the Reed, Nelson, and Jones families, the history of the house was re-discovered in 1931 by J. Alexis Shriver of the Harford Historical Society, who persuaded the owners to clear off the plaster covering the panelled interior for a celebration of the 150th anniversary of General Lafayette's visit.


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
