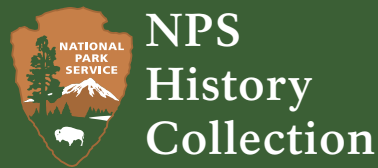
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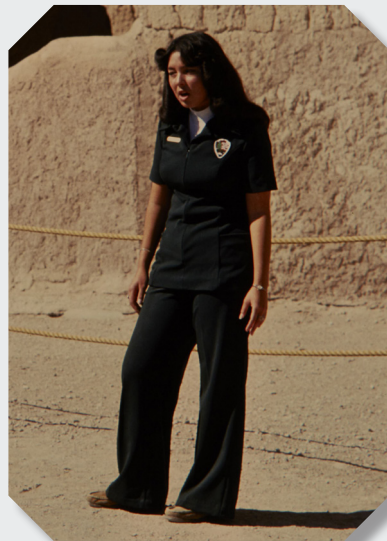

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Park Technician Rita Felix wears the 1974 uniform at Casa Grande National Monument in 1976. The arrowhead patch was worn instead of the ranger badge.



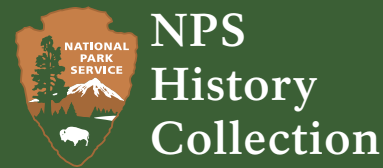

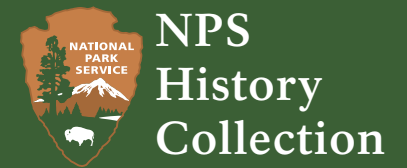
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## NPS Uniforms
