Surrounded by approximately forty cedar and elm trees, the Henry M. McDonald House is located on the corner of Erskine Street and Taylor Avenue in the city of Pierre, South Dakota. It is a two-and-one-half story brick and wood frame Queen Anne style dwelling with some decorative features from the Eastlake and Classical Revival traditions. Red brick masonry walls rise from a rough cut Wood frame gabled wall dormers project from the second stone foundation. story of the south (front), west, and east facades. These gables are highly decorated with fishscale shingles, undulated siding, a series of Eastlake stylized patera, and Classical dentils. Original clapboard siding below the gables has been replaced with asbestos shakes. The house is capped by a Tshaped intersecting gable roof covered with wood shingles. A massive brick chimney rises from the center of the roof line. Located on the southeast corner of the front facade is a small open shed-roofed porch with an Eastlake style balustrade. In recent years, a concrete block garage with modern features has been attached to the northeast (rear) corner of the house.

Fenestration is generally irregular consisting mostly of elongated double-hung windows. For some unknown reason, a window on the west facade was replaced with an ornate wooden panel that features Queen Anne and Eastlake stylistic elements. Located near the entrance on the front facade is a stained and leaded glass multiple-light window typical of Queen Anne styling.

Interior space is divided on a two-room-wide triple pile plan. Outstanding features of the interior decor include built-in bookcases, well preserved hardwood paneling, floors, and woodwork, horizontally opposed fireplaces, pocket doors, and an ornate staircase and newel post. A carved lion's head decorates the birch panels of the library fireplace mantle. Original brass hardware adorns the doors and windows throughout the house. The kitchen was remodeled for modern use, and a half bath was installed on the first floor.

In 1968, the current owner's wife laid out flower beds and an herb garden to the west of the house along Taylor Street. An old carriage path leading in from the street is still visible in the yard.

Under Criterion C of the National Register Criteria, the Henry M. McDonald House is significant in the area of architecture, because it is a good local example of the Queen Anne style popular for domestic housing throughout the state and nation in the latter part of the 19th Century. The house has continuously served as a single-family dwelling since its construction in 1885 and retains much of its original historical character. Under the South Dakota Historical Preservation Plan, the property relates to the historic context labeled: IV. Permanent Rural and Urban Pioneer Settlement, D.2. Urban Development/Residences.

Emanating from the work of English architect Richard Norman Shaw, the Queen Anne style met both high praise and harsh criticism from architects and scholars; however, the public generally embraced it for its picturesque qualities and easy adaptability to comfort and domesticity. At the high point of the movement between 1880 and 1900, Queen Anne stylistic elements most often included irregular floor plans, roof lines, and spatial massing, multiplicity of siding materials especially the use of fishscale shingles, stained and leaded glass multiple-light windows, and unique decorative treatments to gables, porches, projecting bays, and chimneys. Overall the exterior of a Queen Anne style house is highly decorated, displaying a carnival of textures and colors. Richness and comfort are emphasized in interior spaces. The McDonald house illustrates these typical features in one of the oldest extant dwellings in Pierre.

Hughes County and the city of Pierre lie on the east bank of the Missouri River just across from the site of early fur trade and military post Fort Pierre Chouteau, the oldest continuous settlement in South Dakota. Named for territorial legislator Alexander Hughes, the county was organized in 1880 in response to the land rush of the Great Dakota Boom. In the spring of that same year, eight people filed for ownership to the land that was to become On November 3, 1880, the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad began Pierre. to the fledgling townsite making it a vital commercial service and transportation hub for the surrounding region. The town was formally organized in 1883. Because of its rail connections, it soon overshadowed its older sister community of Ft. Pierre. When South Dakota achieved statehood in 1889, Pierre became the state capital and managed to retain that status throughout three successive election campaigns to move it to another city. Although it no longer functions as a transportation center, Pierre continues to serve as the state capital and county seat as well a major retail and tourist stop.

Henry M. McDonald was a pioneer businessman and president of the Trader's Bank in Pierre. In 1884, he began planning the construction of his house at the corner of Taylor and Erskine in what was then referred to as East Pierre.

Located near the site of the short-lived Pierre University, it was one of the first buildings in that part of the community. It was patterned after the Wisconsin home his father-in-law. According to "The City" column of the June 9, 1885, issue of the <u>Pierre Evening Free Press</u>, "a car load of lumber has been received for H. M. McDonald's new brick dwelling, the foundation of which is now being constructed." The house was completed that same year.

During the early 1890s, the Honorable James Ward leased the property from Mc Donald. Ward was a delegate to the 1885 state constitutional convention, former territorial auditor, and 1894 Democratic candidate for Governor of South Dakota. In addition, Ward was a lawyer who held interests in the Merchants Transportation Company, which operated bull trains and stages between Ft. Pierre and Deadwood. Other residents of the property were Willard W. McDonald, a banker; Dudley F. Eakin, a pressman and printer; and Dayton W. Canaday, the present owner and former State Historian for South Dakota. Ed Eakin, who owned the property in 1906, named it "The Cedars" in honor of the cedar hedge along the west edge of the yard.

The period of significance of the nominated property does not extend beyond its date of construction in 1885.
