DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Carroll County Farm Museum is located one mile southeast of the county seat of Westminster, Maryland on South Center Street on 140 acres of green fields and rolling hills.

The inner complex of main house and dependencies numbers fifteen buildings. Most of these are original; two, however, are new structures and two are rebuilt from old materials.

The most prominent of the buildings is the brick main house, around which the others are arranged. Originally designed and constructed for use as the county alms house, it is a long, three-story, rectangular structure, nine bays wide at the first and second floor levels of both the front and rear facades. The main entrance of both elevations is located in the fourth bay in from the west end; a centered door on the second floor levels open onto what were once the galleried roofs of the one-story farm porches. The nine eyebrow windows just below the roof cornices frame casement sash of 2-2 panes; the remaining windows have flat arches and frame sash of six over six panes. The gable roof is covered with tin and a single flush chimney stands at each end of the ridge. Centered on the roof is a simple frame cupola sheltering a farm bell.

The thirty room interior of the building, the first floor of which is now a museum is, like the exterior of the building, devoid of any legitimate attempts at decoration. The majority of the first floor rooms are utilized for exhibit space and house various collections of furnishings and accessories. There is a formal Victorian era parlor, music room, dining room and bedrooms, all furnished as they might have appeared had any one of them been a part of a private residence in the region during the latter part of the nineteenth century.

A separate building set at a right angle to the main house is now used to exhibit crafts of various sorts. Its original purpose is unknown but since it houses the original summer kitchen, wash room and a baking mom it might be that it housed farm and domestic help. It is a two story brick structure containing fourteen rooms and has a recessed two story galleried porch across its west side, the last being a regionally characteristic architectural feature. Crafts displayed and produced here as part of the museum program include quilting, weaving, chair caning, pottery, and tinsmithing.

In addition to these two buildings, there is also a brick, one story dairy with a pyramid roof dominated by a pointed finial of exaggerated height and with Victorian Gothic "icing" decorating the eaves; a large frame and dressed stone bank barn of excellent quality and one of the better examples of its era and type in the region -- a blacksmith's shop, springhouse, smokehouse, icehouse and numerous other sheds and dependencies of various and sundry types, all in good repair and all used as part of the working farm museum activities.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Carroll County Farm Museum's significance is twofold; the preservation of the original Carroll County Almshouse founded in 1852 and the creation of the Farm Museum established in 1965 as a tribute to the great agricultural heritage of the County and the State of Maryland and as a monument to those early pioneers who created this great enterprise.

In 1840 the Commissioners of the Tax of Carroll County were empowered to borrow a sum of money "to be applied to the purchase of a farm, and the creation of suitable buildings for the use of the poor."1 Later the Board of County Commissioners who replaced the Commissioners of Tax were in turn given authority by a legislative act to contract on July 6, 1852, for the purchase of 307 acres at a cost of \$17,826 or \$58.06 1/2 per acre. Records indicate that the Almshouse was built in 1852 and 1/853.

During the week of June 28, 1863, to July 4, 1863, the meadows and fields around the Museum were often filled with troops, mules and Confederate and Union troops as Westminster wagons serving the served as a point of entry and service center for the Battle of Gettysburg.

The numerous lofty shade trees on the front lawn were made possible on November 23, 1874, when the "County Commissioners proceeded to the Almshouse farm and laid out the grounds in front of the Almshouse to plant trees."

The Farm Museum, a creation of the Carroll County Board of County Commissioners, is the first of its kind in Maryland. The Maryland State House of Delegates, in adopting House Resolution #73, congratulated the citizens for their outstanding achievement.

The Museum is a working farm with many fine buildings that rank among central and western Maryland's best examples of pre-Civil War farm architecture. Each of the farm outbuildings has been utilized to display antique tools, and vehicles or to demonstrate crafts or yesteryear. With the exception of the log cabin the Museum remains much as it did in the 1850 period.

Near the entrance to the museum complex and physically separating the parking area from the actual museum grounds stands an early nineteenth century, one story, one room log cabin with a massive fieldstone chimney. This small building, moved here from another location in the county, represents the type of house built and occupied by many settlers of the region in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. To the west of it is the visitors center, a board sheathed building with a fieldstone chimney that is in successful harmony with the living-museum environment.

The 140 acres nominated with the Carroll County Farm Museum were a part of the original 307 acres purchased for the County Almshouse in 1852. The 140 acres are necessary to preserve the original rural setting.

The outbuildings are clustered around the centrally placed almshouse.

The property remained an almshouse until 1965.
