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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Foster-Bell house is a fine example of Tudor revival architecture from the early 1920's. The large (52' by 96') building represents the "mansion" aspect of that style, often called "Stockbroker Tudor." All the major characteristics of the style are seen on the exterior. Today the original interior of the house reflects its historical association with its builder, Thomas D. Foster, while the altered exterior represents the changed tastes of his daughter, Ellen Foster Bell.

Located on a large, well landscaped terraced lot at the corner of Fifth and Market Streets, it is high on a hill overlooking the downtown area and the Des Moines River valley. Nineteenth century Ottumwans referred to this area as "the bluff", and it was The prestigious neighborhood in the community. A number of large residences are located along Fifth Street, but the Foster/Bell house is the dominant building due to its size and its placement at the top of a sloping lot.

This two and one-half story house was originally built by Thomas D. Foster in 1893 from designs drawn by Ottumwa architect Ernest Koch. The building was basically rectangular in plan and neo-classical in design, with Adams Revival style decorative elements on both the interior and the exterior. In 1923 the exterior was completely remodeled into the then popular Tudor revival style. The architect for the renovation project has not been determined. The exterior reflects the major characteristics of Tudor revival: first floor of random ashlar red sandstone, upper stories of simulated half-timber construction, slate roof, and paired gables with vergeboards. The vergeboards on the primary facade have a foliate rinceau pattern executed in stucco.

The interior was untouched by the 1923 remodeling and reflects the original 1893 design. Woodwork throughout is of oak. The first floor is notable for the baronial great hall with beamed ceiling, panelled walls and imposing two run open staircase at the end which has a tri-partite stained glass window on the landing. The mantel is flanked by pilasters featuring a foliated rinceau relief. Three other fireplaces on the main floor have smaller Adams Revival style mantels. The second floor is totally Adams Revival style in detailing with a particularly nice mantel in the front bedroom.

Recently converted into apartments, the only major alterations are those necessitated by fire code and are reversible. The present owner respects the integrity of the house.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Foster/Bell house is a very good example of Tudor revival architecture from the early 1920's, executed on a large scale. The exterior is unaltered from the 1923 original design and exhibits the major characteristics of the style. The structure is of interest locally because it was built by Thomas D. Foster (1847-1915). The remodeled exterior negates the historical significance which linked Foster with the original house, as only the scale of the residence and the interior remain from this period. The location and size of the house comment on the social and economic importance of the Foster and Bell families in the community.

Thomas D. Foster was the chairman and general manager of the John Morrell and Company (meat packing firm) from 1893 until his death in 1915. In 1877 he selected Ottumwa as the site of the main (nationally) John Morrell and Company plant. Morrell's was Ottumwa's largest employer until it closed in 1973. A civic leader, Foster helped establish the East End Presbyterian Church (for his plant workers), the local YMCA, and was a longtime trustee and benefactor of Parsons College in Fairfield, lowa. Foster Hall on the former Parsons College Campus (now Maharishi International University), is named for Foster.

Foster's daughter, Ellen Foster Bell, was the owner during the 1923 renovation. She shared her father's civic and humanitarian goals. The house remained in the family until 1953 when it was purchased by the Ottumwa Community Schools for use as Board of Education offices. In 1982 it was purchased by the present owner and converted into apartments.
