This courthouse is locally significant as the historical focus of county government, and of the political power and prestige derived from the community's status as the county seat. As center of county government, an Iowa town was reasonably assured of economic and population growth, and a prominent role in local social and political life. The county courthouse represents a significant public investment in a structure built not simply for utilitarian purposes, but also as a monument associated with the historical importance of county organization and development.

#### **O'BRIEN COUNTY**

An election on February 6, 1860, resulted in the organization of O'Brien County. At about that time, a log courthouse was built on a farm for about \$2,000, and it measured 14 by 20 feet. For some reason or other, the building was disassembled, moved, and reassembled in a different rural setting. The county was trying to assemble all of its records and offices in one location, but as soon as the courthouse was reconstructed, it was needed for use as a school. In its later days, it was used as a residence, then as a blacksmith shop, and finally as a stable. The new location of this building in 1870 was called "Old O'Brien".

The second county courthouse was finished in April of 1874 at a cost of \$2000 to the county. It was about 35 feet square and housed four offices of nearly equal size, with an eight-foot-wide hallway. This courthouse was built in the new county seat of Primghar, which was established as the center of county government at the election held on November 11, 1872. While this courthouse was being constructed, the county records were stored and official meetings were held in Paine's Store.

The third county courthouse was built in 1887 at a cost of about \$6,000. It was 50 by 54 feet in size and took the place of the 1874 building, which had been condemned as not being a safe place for the public records. Since the bill amounted to \$1,000 more than the board of supervisors could legally spend without a vote of the people, a number of extraordinary measures had to be taken to pay for it. The people of Primghar helped by hauling lumber from Sanborn or Paullina, without charge to the county. An addition was added in 1902 to satisfy the county's growing needs, at a cost of \$1,400. The 1874 courthouse was sold for a little over \$400 and became a residence in Primghar.

The present courthouse was built in 1915 and 1916. It is a large structure of classic design and cost the county in excess of \$159,000.
