#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Situated adjacent to French Park, the George L. Wright house is a large (38' X 66') two story, wood frame building of the Western Stick, or Craftsman, style. originally built as a triplex. The spacious ground floor unit, which was occupied by the owner, has an informal plan, as do the two upstairs units. The upstairs units divide the second floor into two halves perpendicular to the street facade. The ground floor has a veranda that extends across the entire front. Above it there are two sleeping porches for the upstairs units. The use of exposed structural timbers for decorative effect is repeated in the gabled porticos of the front and side entries, multiple lookout beams, exposed rafter tails, and deep barge rafters. The front elevation is symmetrical with the large porch openings framed by brick supports and wood beams on the first floor and with a central arched opening flanked by a pair of wide openings with radiused corners and square posts on the second. A heavy timbered portico projects from the facade plane. The principal side elevation shows the low sloped gable roof with broad eaves which creates great height since the ridge runs with the short axis of the plan. The rear elevation has two gables, one projecting ahead of the other. Overall the effect is horizontal and emphasized by the bevel siding of the first floor, the uniform rows of shingles with a slightly flared skirt of the second story, and the moulding bands at the plate lines. The wide eaves, deep porches, and the breaking up of long planes by bays and porticos create dramatic shadow patterns associated with the Western Stick style. On the other hand, the few curved elements soften an otherwise vigorous Craftsman treatment.

The living room is entered directly through a beveled, eight-light pocket door. This room has a large, curved crown moulding around its perimeter which also incorporates indirect lighting. Typical Craftsman openness of space is seen in the division of the living and dining rooms by means of heavy square posts over built-in bookcases, open at the top. Throughout the house, stained wood of stock sizes is used abundantly in wide trim mouldings, wainscoting and plate rails, built-in sideboards, desks and dressers. Detailing is straightforward. Windows are double hung and square, with the exception of the six or eight light casements in the living rooms of both floors. In the rear bedrooms, there are vertically sliding pocket windows which disappear into the lower part of the wall. In the den, there is a Murphy bed with a beveled glass mirror. The bay window of the dining room is a departure from the usual rectilinearity of this style. The downstairs bath has been remodeled (1950s).

The house occupies a large corner lot. No other buildings occupy the site. One landscaping feature is a seventy foot cedar tree in the rear yard.

Exterior alterations are minimal. Two rear porches have been screened; otherwise, the exterior design remains completely intact. The building is undergoing rehabilitation and conversion into three condominium units. Some interior walls are being rearranged, especially on the second floor where the former side-by-side arrangement of the two units is being changed to front-and-back. The primary spaces, however, are being retained and restored.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

This structure, built in 1913, is the largest and most impressive remaining example of the Craftsman style in the Santa Ana area. In excellent condition, the principal elevations and major rooms have not been altered or remodeled. The house has local significance for its architectural value and for its association with an important local citizen, George L. Wright. Wright arrived in Santa Ana before the real estate boom of 1885-89. At first a carpenter, Wright later went into trucking. He and his wife, Emma, lived on the property for many years prior to building this house. In the 1901 City Directory, they are listed at this address, with George Wright's occupation listed as a truckman. Wright developed his own moving business, known as Wright & Dunkin Transfer and Storage Company, which grew to be the largest in the area. Active in the community, he served on the city council from 1902 to 1906. During his term of office, a new City Hall was built, the streets were paved and the waterworks extended.

The Wright House is a good example of Craftsman architectural styling, popular in Santa Ana in the 1910's. A review of the city's historical and architectural resources inventory indicates that this structure is the most imposing of the numerous local residences in the style. The impressive scale and quality of design of the new house in a popular architectural fashion of the time gives some indication of Wright's newly acquired social and economic success in the local community. The building replaced an earlier 1890's cottage occupied by the Wrights on the same site.
