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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The main building of the Clinchfield Railroad Station is a redbrick rectangular structure with a central tower, the latter showing strong Italianate influence. Arched openings line the one-story building which has raised decorative brickwork between the openings and the roof, and on the tower. The building shows a strong similarity to the highly sophisticated main administration building of the Veterans' Administration Hospital in Johnson City, Tennessee. The latter, built in 1903, no doubt served as the design source for the Clinchfield Railroad Station.

The station faces Main Street where it is intersected by Broad Street, the main artery in Kingsport. Until recently, an open park separated the station from Main Street. On the western side of the park, a large box-shaped prefabricated retail store has been erected. To the east of the station is the <u>square freight</u> building of the railroad. It is also brick and dates later than the main structure.



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With the decision to make Kingsport the industrial center of the Clinchfield Railroad, the development of Kingsport as a modern industrial city was launched. The railroad was a major factor in attracting large plants to the area.

During the last half of the nineteenth century, there had been various projects to build a route from Charleston to Cincinnati. Sections of the road were completed by several railroad companies. In 1902, George L. Carter and his associates purchased one of these companies and organized the South and Western Railway Co. for the purpose of developing the coal fields of Southwest Virginia and Kentucky. Large tracts of coal fields were acquired in an area which became famous as the "Clinchfield Section."

In 1905, Carter had financial difficulties. John B. Dennis, a partner in the New York banking firm which gained control of the railroad, purchased the company. With an eye to developing the natural resources of the area and to making Kingsport its best customer, Dennis designated the city the operational center of the railroad. The Clinchfield formed a "bridge line" between the Middle West and the Piedmont section of the Carolinas, cutting through the Kentucky and Virginia coal fields. It allowed Kingsport to become the major industrial center as envisioned by Dennis and others.

The placement of the railroad station was designed to serve as a focal point in the planned city of Kingsport. The main artery of the city, Broad Street, begins at the station, runs through the business district to a gentle rise, at which there is a street encircling a small park, originally to be called Civic Circle, now known as Church Circle. Photographs through the 1940's show the avenue as first conceived with its many trees along the side and in the center strip. Since then, the plantings have been removed. The Clinchfield Raflroad Station on Main Street, however, remains the sempler boundary for the business district, and visually, the remnnal point of Broad Street.
