Kaupo School is a two-room school house built in a vernacular single-wall construction style utilizing tongue-and-groove vertical boards often used for rural schools throughout Hawai'i. It is located on the Government Road, at the junction with a secondary road that leads towards the mountains, in the isolated rural town of Kaupo with Haleakala looming in the background. It is set back on the lot, with a walkway from the road to the front steps. The walkway is lined on both sides with coconut palms. The lot is surrounded by a rock wall. A teacher's cottage is located to the west, within the school lot.

The single story schoolhouse is raised on wood piers with vertical slats along the skirt of the building and a corrugated metal gable roof with large overhangs which extend over the ocean-facing porch. The original building is five bays wide with a wood staircase punctuating the center bay. The stairs are of wood, except the concrete landing with handrailings constructed of 2 X 4s. The stairs lead directly up to two four-panel doors, each leading to an adjoining classroom. Above the doors and along the top wall of the verandah are 1/4" mesh screens to provide maximum air ventilation. A double row of girts on the exterior below the screens provide stability for the interior chalkboards.

Each classroom is approximately 28' by 22' by 10'-10" high. There are two large 4' wide wooden sliding doors between the rooms, in the center of the shared wall. There are five 6-lite triple-hung windows in each classroom. The bottom panel slides up and is held open with metal pins, rather than counter weights. The windows are 9 feet in overall height providing maximum northern light. The other three walls feature chalk boards with girts above and below the chalkboards providing additional stability for the single wall construction.

The building has been wired for electricity; there are six single light builb sockets in the ceiling of each classroom; obtained from a generator which was housed in a small outbuilding off the west side of the school.

The eastern most bay is enclosed while the rest of the bays constitute the verandah. This bay is accessed from the verandah through a four-panel door and was once the library. It features a six-over-six double-hung window at the front facade.

An addition of three bays approximately 24' by 13' for bathrooms was built off the west end of the porch. Though at the same level, it is not as wide as the original, creating a lower roof ridge line. There are two restroom areas with three stalls and two sinks in each. Wooden lattice work across the front of the lanai defines the addition and provides a sense of privacy. The gable end of the addition features triangulated beams and no windows.

The teacher's cottage is a simple, 2 bedroom, single-wall constructed house also built in the vernacular style utilizing tongue and groove vertical boards with a corner inset entry porch. Relatively square in plan, the corrugated metal hip roof is almost pyramidal. Windows are two-over-two double-hungs, mostly paired. Horizontal slats surround the raised pier foundation.

There have been very few alterations, except for the addition of the restrooms, which were probably done at a very early year, utilizing similar construction and materials. Although somewhat deteriorated, the integrity of the interior of the classrooms and windows are very rare.

Kaupo School, like Keanae School (Hawai`i Register) along the Hana Highway, is a rare example of the small rural school in Hawaii, especially in Maui County where much grander educational facilities were supported as an expression of permanency. Built as a two-room school house circa 1923, the Kaupo School was built to service the small isolated community of Kaupo and has the ambiance of a rural town. The wooden frame building, simple in design with a generous lanai, is a representative example of the vernacular architecture that was typical of rural educational facilities in Hawaii during the 1920s and 1930s.

It originally held grades 1 through 6 and, as education progressed in the territory raising the level of education children attended, the two rooms had to service grades Kindergarten through eighth grade, with just one school teacher and the principal doubling as teacher.

For many years Kaupo village was cut off by "precipitous cliffs on one side, Haleakala crater on the other, a barren wasteland of lava on the third. The pacific pounds her shores on the fourth." Therefore, its isolation was thought by many to be the reason it has remained "Hawaiian." When the Kipahulu to Kaupo road was built through a WPA project and open to traffic in 1937, a series of articles described the "quaint" Hawaiian lifestyle that continued in Kaupo. The school was very much a part of that community.

The school was originally established in the 19th century as indicated in a photo from the Bishop Museum Archives dated 1891. However, according to tax records, the current building and the teachers cottage was built circa 1922-23, a time when Maui County saw great expenditures for schools. The student population was naturally the neighboring families, of which were mostly Hawaiian. The 1950s and 1960s saw a decline in population of the area as many people moved to bigger towns. In 1964, the school was officially closed when the population dwindled to 5 students. Thereafter, the students were sent to Hana School, a two hours drive away.

In 1982, after a series of landslides blocked the road to Hana, the school re-opened briefly to provide the children with needed education, while the teacher drove the bumpy road around the other end to continue lessons for the students. Since the road re-opened, the school has been vacant except for a few community uses. The teacher's cottage has been rented continuously. The years of significance stop at 1946 due to the guidelines set forth in National Register Bulletin 16A.




10. Verbal Boundary Description
