

Description

Amistad Gymnasium is a rectilinear, one-story gymnasium/ auditorium with a partial basement, cement stucco-covered walls. and a barrel vault roof with a sheet metal covering. The facade is symmetrical with two recessed entries with double doors flanked by paired windows. The interior consists of a gymnasium with a hardwood floor and a stage with a basement located beneath it. The gymnasium is located in the middle of Amistad, a community consisting of approximately two dozen buildings. Alterations include a small concrete block storage room behind the building and a locker room at the rear northwest corner. In 1955 a classroom wing, extended in 1965, was added to the east side, adjoined to the gymnasium by a corridor. These additions, however, do not detract from its appearance and feeling as a New Deal project. The building is in excellent condition, and local citizens have sought to protect the gymnasium by adding a sheet metal roof over the original asphalt roof.

The building has a concrete foundation and a reinforced concrete frame with a steel frame supporting the barrel vault roof. The walls, framed by concrete piers and capped by a slight parapet, are dried adobe bricks with a beige, cement stucco covering. The combination of the earth-toned stucco coating and parapet with the vertical piers creates a hybridized stylistic appearance blending the Spanish-Pueblo Revival and Art Deco Styles, the latter also apparent in the stylized Zia suns on the facade bearing the building's construction date of 1937.

The gymnasium has 9/9/9 triple-hung wood sash windows with concrete sills. The two main entries are recessed with double wood doors opening onto low concrete porches. The interior consists of an oak floor flanked by three tiers of wooden bleachers and a stage framed by corbelled brackets. A dressing room and the building's mechanical room are behind the stage.

The main entry of the classroom wing is also a recessed double door, and the windows are metal casement and aluminum hopper. The classroom wing is perpendicular to the gymnasium, connected to it by a corridor with double doors. Set well back on

the east side of the gymnasium, the classroom wing is landscaped with evergreens and intrudes only slightly on the historic appearance of the gymnasium facade.

Statement of Significance

Funded as a WPA project in 1935 but not constructed until 1937, Amistad's gymnasium/auditorium is a well-preserved example of the many rural gymnasium/auditorium projects New Deal programs carried out in New Mexico. Designed, in part, to relieve unemployment in Union County and, in part, to offer local residents a gathering place for recreation, the Amistad gymnasium/auditorium is significant under Criterion A as a reminder of how the New Deal's efforts to construct community recreational facilities affected Amistad's social history and leisure activities. The building is also eligible under Criterion C as a good example of the plans, methods of construction, materials and workmanship New Deal projects employed in carrying out numerous recreational facility projects in New Mexico.

Located in the northeast corner of New Mexico, Union County lay near the heart of the dust bowl of the southern High Plains, and its small ranching and farming communities, homesteaded less than three decades earlier, were devastated by the drought of the early 1930s. Amistad, in the southern part of the county, was particularly hard hit, and as the WPA got under way in 1935, road improvement and construction projects were funded to create work relief jobs for the area's residents. In October, 1935 the WPA authorized \$15,000 for the construction of a gymnasium/auditorium, a project that officials estimated would create almost fifty jobs.

Delays postponed the construction project for a year; and it wasn't until January, 1937 that the WPA's district engineer, J.R. Islar, drew plans for the gym. As the project that included the installation of a modern steam heating plant and over-sized windows to supply light and ventilation got under way, the

Clayton News described it as one "that would be a credit for a town ten times the size of Amistad." Using a reinforced concrete frame for the building, workers constructed thousands of dried adobe bricks for the non-load bearing walls. This effort to combine modern building techniques with local materials and building practices typified rural WPA projects throughout New Mexico.

By August, most of the project had been completed, and a dance featuring the Rhythm Kings was held to raise money to install the lighting system. Notices for similar dances, roller skating parties and basketball tournaments appear in the Clayton News during the years leading to World War II, suggesting that the gymnasium project succeeded in its goal of providing the sparsely populated area with a gathering place for socializing and recreating. Even after a school wing was added in the 1950s, the gymnasium continued to serve not only as Amistad's school athletic facility but as a community gathering place. Residents intent upon preserving the gym raise funds through sponsoring an annual basketball tournament, using last year's proceeds to add the sheet metal roof above the original one.
