Describe present and historic physical appearance.

The Washington County Courthouse is a detached two-story public building constructed of concrete with a veneer of mixed paint and sand. The building has a long, rectangular plan with the horizontal massing of the Moderne style. The front (north) elevation has nine bays formed by a centered entrance flanked by four window bays on either side. The concrete steps up to this main entrance to the building have lamps set either side of the entry doors; there are small vertical windows either side of the entry and a band of three vertical secondstory windows above the entry. The east elevation has a centered entrance with three window bays to the north and two to the south. The west elevation has a centered entrance with two window bays either side of it. The rear elevation has twelve window bays. The roof is flat.

Alterations to the building include the replacement of first-floor windows with aluminum-frame single panes and replacement of the north doors with aluminum-frame doors. These replacements are compatible in materials. While the loss of original doors and windows has some effect on the building's integrity, the remaining original fabric and massing of the building conveys the important characteristics of the Moderne style, and the building conveys a sense of the period in which it was built as a late WPA project.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

The Washington County Courthouse is significant under criterion "A" in the context of the development of county government as supported by WPA and PWA monies throughout the Depression years. The building is significant under criterion "C" in the context of the architecture of Idaho's county courthouses and as a local example of institutional architecture. The building retains its original massing and most of its Moderne style features, including its concrete walls, original second-story windows, and fenestration. The remaining original fabric conveys the important characteristics of Moderne style, and the building conveys a sense of the period in which it was built as a late WPA project.

Because the building is part of a finite and endangered group of resources associated with the WPA in Idaho and because it is associated with a relief program that had exceptional impact on the Idaho landscape and economy during the Depression years, the building is presented for nomination before it reaches the 50 year mark.

Washington County received support from the WPA regional office in Portland, Oregon, for construction of a new courthouse after the Washington County Courthouse was destroyed by fire in February, 1938. The WPA provided labor for construction of the new building, and the county provided materials. Architects Tourtellotte and Hummel of Boise were chosen to design the courthouse, and a Boise builder, J. F. Ulmer, directed WPA laborers in its construction. The courthouse was completed in the fall of 1939 and dedicated December 1. However, the final part of the project, a sprayed veneer of paint and fine sand, was not applied until the next spring.

## National Register of Historic Places Continuation Sheet

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The Washington courthouse is one of four courthouses designed by Tourtellotte and Hummel for WPA projects during 1936-1939. Although all of their WPA courthouse designs draw upon the Art Deco and Moderne styles, each of the four buildings has a distinct character. The Washington County building is the most recent and plainest of the four; in it, the streamlined, horizontal Moderne style is uppermost. Like most of Idaho's county courthouses, the Washington courthouse is the most ambitious and stylistically elaborate architectural design of its era, in its locality and its region, and deserves National Register listing on that basis as well as for its contribution to our understanding of the range of architectural designs used for courthouses in Idaho.
