## 7. Description

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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

This is a four-story Renaissance Revival style building with a projecting central pavilion that has rusticated quoins. It is actually two buildings behind a unified facade, a common technique that gave the city's early Victorian buildings a more prominent appearance. The date of construction (1887) and the developers' initials ("C" for Henry M. Caldwell and "M" for Willis J. Milner) are incorporated in the facade ornamentation. Architrave-framed windows at the second floor are capped by alternating triangular and segmental pediments and at the third floor by cornice window heads; in the pavilion these forms are repeated, enlarged, over narrow paired windows. The formality of the facade becomes freer at the fourth floor, where round-headed windows with winged cherub heads as keystones alternate with paired pilasters, which correspond to paired foliated consoles above them. A Frieze with inset panels and festoons and a modillioned cornice complete the entablature. Recent rehabilitation by a local architectural firm for use by a local bank restored the architectural dignity of the structure and successfully incorporated drive-in facilities at the much remodelled street level. None of the interior features have survived.

#### **Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)**


Built at the height of the city's first boom by two officers of the Elyton Land Company, the Caldwell-Milner Building is the finest example of the Victorian Renaissance Revival style left in the city. Constructed by a London-born contractor, Henry M. Allen, it was a premier office building, the first in Birmingham to have elevators and steam heat. Intended to house realtors and insurance agents when it was built around the corner from the Elyton Land Company Office, it has since served as a lumber company, drug and feed store, savings and loan firm, office supply company, and now as a full service bank. The Caldwell-Milner Building and the adjacent McAdory Building, both built before the industrial city was 20 years old, testify to the rapid growth in wealth and sophistication that gained Birmingham the title Magic City. The two buildings (being concurrently nominated) are enhanced by one another and suggest the character of the commercial district in the late 1880s.
