DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The early settlers conducted worship services in an 1856 log schoolhouse until 1868 when they moved into their completed stone church. Its construction began in 1864.

The exterior walls are two feet thick and of cut limestone laid in coursed rubble masonry. The overall dimensions of the original church measure approximately 36 by 60 feet. The nave is 36 X 45 feet and the chancel area 15 X 25 feet, all within a ceiling height of 21 feet. A steeple 92 feet high rises over the church at the east end in which a bell was placed in 1868.

The floor system consists of two huge timbers laid lengthwise between the two walls with log joists placed perpendicular to them on top. Between the log joists, sawed lumber joists span the width on top of the beams. Nailed to the log and sawed joists are floor boards.

Certain modifications have been made to the structure. The main addition has been a stone narther 14 X 28 feet at the east end in 1941. A wooden addition in the back houses the pastor's study and library. In the interior, the walls were lathed and plastered in 1898. A furnace was installed in 1891, followed by electric lights in 1904.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The significance of the First Lutheran Church rests on both historical and architectural grounds. It is historically important for its association with an outstanding pioneer leader of Norwegian immigrants in the Midwest, who founded St. Ansgar, Pastor C.L. Clausen (1820-1892). Carlton Qualey writes of Danish-born Clausen in his <u>Norwegian Settlement in the United</u> States:

Clausen was popular and active in the pioneer Norwegian settlements, and through his missionary activities and his writings he became widely known. He was one of the founders of the Norwegian Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and was one of the storm centers of early church factional controversy. [On the controversial Civil War issue of slavery, Clausen led the opposition to the view of Norwegian Synod pastors that it was not in itself a sin to keep slaves.] In addition to his religious work, Clausen engaged in considerable journalistic activity. He was the first editor of the influential Norwegian-American newspaper, <u>Emigranten</u>, and was also associated for a time in the publication of a monthly Lutheran church paper, the <u>Luthersk</u> maanedstidende.

As an important colonizer on behalf of Norwegian immigrants unacquainted with the new country, he extensively investigated and publicized possible areas for settlement. To one such area, St. Ansgar, Iowa, he personally led in 1853 a forty wagon caravan of seventy-five settlers. Clausen staked out 120 acres for the townsite and called it St. Ansgar after the saint who brought Christianity to the "Far North of Europe." For the next twenty years he served there as pastor, counsellor and civic and political leader and, according to Theodore Blegen, he "took a leading part in the business affairs of the colony."

Architecturally, the 1868 limestone building is a good example of vernacular Gothic Revival style. Two of its most distinguishing features are the lancet windows on the side of the church that are set in recessed panels, and the bottom edge of the cornice that contains a Gothic arch motif repeated on the spire. No single architect guided the building's design or construction. Reverend Clausen supplied what information he had concerning building churches, and the chief stone masons, the Rauk Bros. and the Sveidengard Bros., together with the two head carpenters, designed and improvised as the building progressed. The resulting building, completed in 1868, is of simple beauty and durability and is the oldest church in M, tchell County.

Addendum to #7 (ref. Para. 4, sentence 3)

The 'wooden addition in the back' is a very small, one-story frame structure. It has a brick foundation, gable roof, and is covered with wide vertical siding painted white. Its date of construction is unknown, but it appears in a photo dated 1875 so must have been built before then. It contains a pastor's study and small meeting room.

Only the church building with its frame extension is included in this nomination. There is a small modern garage/storage room toward the rear of the property, which does not qualify for inclusion. The parish hall (b. 1960) is across the street from the church on another lot.

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
