The Des Moines Post Office building was designed in 1908 by the Treasury Department architectural staff under the supervision of James Knox Taylor  $\checkmark$  The original plans showed a classical style building on the North end of a block containing existing commercial structures.

The broad face of the white tooled limestone building is seen from Walnut Street, then the commercial thoroughfare of the Des Moines business district. The block is contained between West First Street and Second Avenue and Walnut and Court Streets.

While a short block away, the Des Moines River seems to be an essential part of the vista in which the building is located. No construction blocks the area between the Post Office and the River.

A series of attached round Corinthian columns line the principal front (North) of the building. The first story windows are arch topped, more Roman in feeling. Main entrances on the Northeast and Northwest corners are pedimented and flanked by round columns also. Second story windows are divided by smaller round columns. East and West faces are similar to the North but with flat pilasters and capitals between windows.

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Limestone facing is curiously tooled in vertical striations. Pilaster and Column cushions, ogee curves, all are marked by the same striations.

Not yet completed in 1910, the building underwent some minor changes in the South side, the service end and facing the rear of the commercial buildings on that end of the block. One such building still stands though four floors have been removed and is still in use by the Postal service as dock space.

Plans were completed in 1935 for a major enlargement to the South. This added two upper floors of building space and provided a lowered basement garage for the growing postal department use of motor vehicles.

This, addition is in the same classical style though simplified and using the same stone, though not striated. The South wall of the addition is buff brick masonry. Subsequent work has added a new boiler and equipment room on the Southwest corner.

Structural frames for both the original building and addition are steel. Concrete flat- slab floors are found in the original building and concrete pan joist floors in the addition. Skylights over the original postal work space were closed during construction of the mechanical equipment room in order that exterior ductwork and fancoil units could be located over them when the airconditioning was installed.

Interior lobby space in the original building is noteworthy for its light and classical proportion. Subsequent mechanical and electrial additions disregarded this handsome setting. Some wall bracket gas lamps were electrified and do still remain.

A marble wainscot with graceful plaster groined vault arches are lighted by arched windows on the first story. Plaster rosettes once were the upper terminals of suspended iron light fixtures. Floors in the public spaces are terrazzo with marble borders.

Access to the second floor area is gained by marble steps with iron balusters, floral leaved newel posts and polished brass handrails.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

As a part of a concerted community plan to erect a governmental complex on the banks of the Des Moines River, the Post Office was the focal point of the Federal Government participation in local government planning.

Only one other existing governmental structure predates the Post Office. It is the Public Library built in 1901. Subsequently, the City Hall, Municipal Court and Federal Court Buildings were constructed.

The Post Office manifested much of the image of vital and growing federal power and only through the Post Office and Federal Court buildings did the average citizen make contact with his government.

In this building the government put its best foot forward. The building was well detailed of enduring materials, and while an eclectic composition of classical details and <u>Romanesque</u> fenestrations, it is a superbly composed and orderly structure. Great lanterns of acanthus leaves support white opal light globes and flank each principal entrance stairs. Interior detailing of the Post Office desks and lamps and stair newel posts is a frank expression of Art Nouveau.

The Post Office remains the best example of classicism in design in the central Iowa area and is the best preserved. The stone work remains in excellent condition with the detail still crisp in line and form. The detail in Corinthian column capitals and doorway pedimentation is noteable, an outstanding example of building ornamentation and style that will never be constructed again.



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
