DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Frederick Spangenberg House occupies a prominent site at 375 Mount Curve Boulevard in Saint Paul. The house and gardens (three city lots) are all that remains of the original 80-acre farmstead which Spangenberg constructed during the years from 1864 through 1867. The barns and outbuildings are no longer extant, however, the house remains in essentially original appearance and in an excellent state of preservation.

The Spangenberg House is comprised of two parts; a two storey portion which formerly contained parlor, dining room, and bedroom on the first floor and four bedrooms on the second; and a one storey kitchen appendage. It is constructed of local yellow limestone in random coursing. Finished limestone lintels and sills are a dominant architectural feature on windows and doors. The original three brick chimneys remain, however, only two are functional today.

Glassed-in porches have been added to the front and rear entries to serve as vestibules. The design of these do not pose a harsh contrast to the design integrity of the house itself.

Windows boast exterior shutters. The historical authenticity of these shutters is confirmed by early photos. Windows on the first storey are of the casement variety and those on the second storey are six-over-six double hung. The placement of windows and doors are toward the outer face of the limestone wall, allowing a sill of approximately two feet in depth to be utilized on the interior. The appearance suggests a provincial variance on the Federal style.

The interior is nearly devoid of architectural embellishment; all mouldings and door frames being of extremely simple painted boards. The only decorative treatment is a splat-type balustrade on the second floor which separates the hall from the open stairwell. The only substantial alteration to the interior was made in 1932 when the former kitchen was converted into a sitting room and a fireplace constructed in that room. At that time, also, the former first storey bedroom was converted into a kitchen and the parlor was changed in function to the dining room. The rear second storey bedroom was made into a bathroom.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Frederick Spangenberg House is significant as one of the earliest limestone farm houses to be preserved in Saint Paul. It was constructed by Spangenberg, a frugal German dairy farmer, of local limestone and on a site which during the 1860s was far from the urban hub of Saint Paul. Although now engulfed by residences of a twentieth century vintage, the house continues to function as a comfortable residence and serves as a testimony to Spangenberg's perseverance and skilled craftsmanship in stone.

The Spangenberg House was occupied continuously by the Spangenberg family decendents since the time of construction until 1972 when it was sold to the present owners, who are extremely conscious of the historic architectural merit of it. They have continued to provide for the preservation of both the house and grounds.
