DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

A 5 bay, gable roofed, 2 story house, with inside end chimneys, the house is built of brick in "lemish bond and three row common bond. The entrance door has a beautiful Chines Chippendale transom. The one bay, one story entrance porch has a flat roof on h round posts of 2 like pilasters (not original). The layout is central block with one wing. The wing, 1 1/2 story, 2 bays, predates the house by only a few years and has a large fireplace on both bloors. The main house has a central hall plan, two rooms each side. Three fireplaces are on the ground floor and two are on the second, one being in a large double size room, the ballroom. The ballroom and parlor have like mantels. The single paneled frieze is flanked by paneled end blocks supporting a shelf with molded edge and square cornered projections over the blocks. Pilasters are half round fluted columns on plain bases. Some rooms have small 2 tiered, paneled door cupboards next to the fireplace. Other mantels have a plain, single paneled frieze on paneled pilasters. In most of the rooms, the trim consists of short lintel construction, with a large astragal and an architrave backband. Other rooms have rosette corner blocks on pedestaled facings that relate to the paneled mantel pilasters. The main open string stairway reaches the third floor in 4 flights. There is only one starting newel, a very slender round and tapered post with a neck molding. The handrail is also round in section and very small. The stairway curves gracefully at each flight of steps. Two round and tapered balusters are on each step and the step end decoration consists of a "double comma" scroll. All rooms have a chair rail, much of it identical in section to the paneled pilasters. Door jambs are also single paneled. Windows are 9/6 on the 1st floor and 6/6 on the 2nd and most have splayed, paneled reveals. The mantels and trim relate through the different rooms, one of the special features of this fine Federal period house, ca. 1813.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Myers House is significant for its architecutral type and economics. The Myers family settled on the Opequon Creek and acquired larger holdings. They built the brick house ca. 1817. The Myers family were of Pennsylvania Dutch origin.

- A. The Myers house in an outstanding example of American Federal architecture in the true classic sense. Absent are the garlands and urns of Adams. Present is the linearcity of American Federal in the delicate paneled friezes and pilasters of the mantels and trim. All of the architectural elements are original None have been changed or even modified. This is why the house is important architecturally. It is a true statement in architecture of American Federal design at its finest.
 A house of this size and design could only have been built by a well-to-do family and the Myers family was. They contributed greatly to the cultural and economic development of this area. Owning and successfully managing nearly 1,500 acres, they provided jobs for many people in the area allowing them to support their families and thus for this area to develop in agriculture, trade and commerce.
- B. The 1 1/2 story wing is the earlier section and was built ca. 1815. The entire house was completed ca. 1817.
