DESCRIPTION

ARCHITECTURAL STYLE Italianate/Villa DATE c.1878 2 stories, hipped roof, 3-bay front w/entry to left at base of FORM rectangular, 3-stage tower; polygonal window bay east side brick on coursed stone foundation; brick chimney; wood trim MATERIALS new aluminum sash, set below segmental arched heads FENESTRATION double-door entry w/chamfered top corners; bracketted modillion FEATURES cornice, with molding strip defining frieze; dormered tower roof; pedimented porch w/sunburst and latticework superimposed over entrance; main veranda w/thin columns; bowed front wall ALTERATIONS porches appear to date from later in the 19th century set well back from street on shaded lot SITE

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE The Eldridge house is a distinguished local example of the Victorian Italianate style. It is one of a handful of residences built here in the early-mid 1870's that were clearly inspired by the Villa style. Basically, these houses combined the rectangular, hipped-roof form of the Italianate with the Villa-style tower, and also featured, though not always, the latter's asymmetry of form. The bowed front wall of the Eldridge house is a most unusual feature, and may indicate that this house was a work of local architect Willett Carroll, to whom the only other example of this feature (in the Price-Vollmer house on Brady Street) is attributed. In fact, if the south wing of the Price-Vollmer house were removed, it would bear a remarkable resemblance to the Eldridge house.

If Carroll were indeed the architect of the Eldridge house, its significance is further enhanced, as few works by this important 19th century architect have been recorded in the city.

Theodore Eldridge (cousin of early Davenport HISTORICAL DATA settler and real estate speculator, D.C. Eldridge) was in residence at this address by 1878. Eldridge operated a restaurant and confectionery (ice cream) known as "Eldridge Bros." in downtown Davenport. Eldridge lived above his business before moving to E. 10th Street.
