ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION: The Craig-Seay House is a two-and-a-half story, multi-gable roofed, picturesquely massed and fenestrated, frame Queen-Anne/Colonial Revival house on a residential lot facing south. The chief ornamental features of the building are derived from the one-story, wraparound verandah which encircles the front and east elevations and from the second-story pedimented pavilion which contains an arcaded balcony and a tympanum oranamented by sunburst carvings and a modified Palladian window. The main entrance is a single-leaf door with upper square, glass panel surmounted by a transom. Remaining fenestration throughout the building is highly picturesque, including three one-over-one double-hung sash along molded, convex southeast corner, a large lozenge-shaped light near the entrance, and twelve-over-one sash in the second-story sleeping porch (a later addition). One gable also has large semi-circular vent. The second-story porch has heavy, square, paneled pillars with molded capitals, archivolt trim, and keystones and is guarded by turned balusters. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE: The Craig-Seay House is significant as a turn-of-the-century product of architect Andrew Johnson. The house shows Johnson's capable transition from his L-shaped cottage style to the more elaborate residences preferred at the turn-of-the-century. The residence is interesting for its successful combination of Queen Anne and Colonial Revival elements.
