#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

7. Description

The Tioga Commissary (c.1900) is a single story, frame, galleried building of no particular architectural style. It is located next to the Missouri-Pacific railroad line in what remains of the old Tioga sawmill community. The building has been little altered since construction.

The structure consists of a single large space with two rows of hypostyle square posts. The interior is plain with flush board sheathing on the walls and ceiling. The floorboards are original as are some of the counters.

The principal elevation features a thirteen bay chamfered post gallery with a beaded board entablature and a forward-facing gable at each end. Under each gable is a standard commercial plate glass shopfront with paneled bulkheads. The facade is ornamented with panels of diagonally set beaded boards.

The only changes in the building since construction have been the installation of fixed awnings over the rear and side windows and burglar bars on all the windows. These alterations, of course, are certainly minor,

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Criterion A

The Tioga Commissary is locally significant in the area of industry because it is an important visual reminder of the early twentieth century lumber boom in Rapides Parish.

Three factors have shaped the economic development of Rapides Parish: agriculture, transportation systems (the Red River and numerous railroads), and the lumber industry. The first two are themes running throughout the parish's history, while the lumber industry's "golden years" were the first three decades of this century. The first large mill, the J. A. Bentley Lumber Company, was established in 1891 in Zimmerman by J. A. Bentley and E. W. Zimmerman. Before very long the ensuing lumber boom had changed the face of Rapides Parish, with twelve or so sawmill towns dotting the landscape, towns such as Ball, Tioga, McNary, Woodworth and Longleaf. Of course, crucial to this boom was the railroad. Tioga, for example, had three lines passing through it, as well as being the western terminus for a branch line.

Lee Lumber Company operated out of Tioga from 1900 until 1925, when the timber resources were depleted and the mill was closed. Although the extent of historic structures in Tioga during the 1900-1925 era is not documented, it is certain that the community was never a large company town like Elizabeth, Fisher or Bogalusa. For example, Elizabeth had a population of about 3,000 during its boom years and boasted numerous company built and owned buildings in addition to housing (schools, churches, hotels, a mercantile store, a hospital, etc.). Tioga, to put things in perspective, had only a population of about 400, and probably never had much more than housing, the commissary, and the mill.

The recently completed historic structures survey for Rapides Parish reveals that little remains to directly represent the sawmill era. Extant resources include a sawmill at Longleaf, the commissary at Tioga, a superintendent's house at McNary, an owner's house and a small abandoned post office at Longleaf, and a few cottages scattered here and there. Of these, the sawmill and commissary are the lumber industry's most exemplary resources because, unlike a worker's cottage where an individual family might have lived, they were centers of company activities, embracing all or most of the people involved in the lumbering operation. Indeed, commissaries were often social focal points where workers gathered, were paid and received their provisions.




