Lynchburg Presbyterian Church, on S.C. Highway 341 just southeast of the city limits of Lynchburg, in Lee County, South Carolina, is a late antebellum, two-story temple-form, Greek Revival style building with an engaged tetrastyle portico featuring four massive stuccoed solid brick columns. Set upon an open pier brick foundation and sheathed in six-inch wide weatherboard, the building is a local interpretation of the Tuscan order of architecture. The columns measure twenty-one inches in diameter, extend twenty-two feet in height, are set upon enlarged, high plinth blocks that are set directly in the ground, and feature elongated capitals with an unusually low necking band. The outer columns are freestanding, while the two central ones are engaged to the modern brick steps that access the equally modern recessed porch deck with iron handrails. Within the portico are two double-leaf entrances with simple molded surrounds. No other fenestration is present on the building's facade. A small triangularly-shaped, bifurcated and louvered ventilator interrupts the wide expanse of the portico's pediment. Corner and wall pilasters adorn each side elevation. Between each pilaster is a nine-over-nine, double-hung sash window, measuring eight feet in height and three feet, four inches in width on the first floor and a six-over-six, double-hung sash window, measuring five feet in height and three feet, four inches in width. The lower windows are currently covered with corrugated metal panels, while those on the gallery level feature louvered wooden shutters. A simple entablature with unadorned frieze and boxed cornice completes the side elevations. The building's rear [northeast] elevation has a boxed cornice and returns [open pediment] with no fenestration on either level. The gable roof is currently clad with asphalt gravel shingles that in 1989 replaced four layers of asphalt shingles and two sets of cypress shingles.

The interior is primarily a single room with plaster walls and twenty-one foot high ceiling, undecorated except for a large circular plaster medallion in the center. The original plaster is largely intact except for spots of water intrusion damage in the ceiling that occurred unnoticed before the roof was replaced in 1989. Paneled wainscoting surrounds the interior space along the outer walls, while a paneled balustraded gallery supported by square pillars with capitals extends along the southwest, northwest and southeast sides of the building's interior space. Their entrance was accessed through the back of the building by two narrow passages to steep staircases that have been removed

A pilaster and panel-surrounded proscenium arch with recessed, canted pulpit bay or chancel dominates the sanctuary at the northeast end of the building. A smaller plaster medallion adorns the chancel ceiling. A sub-ceiling covering the opening of the ceiling and second story galleries was installed in 1940 for heating purposes but has been recently removed. At one time the upper galleries served as elementary Sunday school rooms before new rooms were added to the rear of the building in 1939. These additions have also been removed and the original back wall replaced.

Behind the Communion table are the pulpit and chairs on a raised platform within the central recessed chancel. On the east side the chancel is flanked by the choir section which is fronted by a floor-mounted curtain apron and old pump organ which is still playable. The pews are divided into

three sections; the northwest and southeast sections are below the two upper galleries that are supported by solid heart pine seven-inch square pillars. The seven center pews are nine feet long. The nine north pews and the eleven south pews are all eight feet long. All pew boards, backs, seats and sides are of solid heart pine and hand hewn; pew backs and sides are paneled. All flooring boards are also heart pine, random width and hand hewn. The pine floor joists are up to twenty feet long. Some dowel and peg fastening construction was used but is not visible. The entire building measures forty-one feet long and thirty-eight feet wide plus the nine-foot front portico.

The back half of the church's three-acre lot is the church cemetery, with random placed plots and monuments of various designs and dates from the mid-nineteenth century through the late twentieth century. Most common gravestone types include table-top tombs, obelisks and tablets carved from marble or granite. To the rear of the cemetery an annex of more than an acre has been added where the most recent burials are located. The historic cemetery and cemetery annex are both maintained by the Lynchburg Cemetery Association. Only the historic section of the cemetery and the church, comprising 1.87 acres, is included in this nomination.

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Lynchburg Presbyterian Church, built in 1855, is significant as an excellent example of late antebellum Greek Revival ecclesiastical architecture. It is one of the few antebellum buildings still extant in the original community of Lynchburg (now South Lynchburg). This area was named Lynchburg because of the close proximity of Lynch's River, sometimes known as Lynch's Creek.

This three-acre site was donated to the congregation by Mrs. Anna English Law in 1855. Ownership was challenged and went to court in 1856, but title was perfected by court order in 1856 and 1857. The sanctuary was built by members of the congregation, with the assistance of members of the Lynchburg Methodist Church and several slaves and free blacks as well.

The church is on the east-west route between Sumterville and Florence, which would later become a flourishing rail center. The first store and post office in Lynchburg are at the crossroad of this east-west route with the north-south route known as "the Mecklenburg Road", one which connected Charleston and Georgetown to Kingstree, then through Lynchburg on to Bishopville and Cheraw, and then to connections to Charlotte, N.C. The road through Lynchburg ran almost parallel to the high ground at Lynch's Creek. The crossroad to Florence crossed the river at a ferry two miles east of the church. The Mecklenburg Road was a dirt road until 1934, when it was paved and designated S.C. Highway 341.

When the railroad was built in 1854 a mile north of the church in a settlement then called "Magnolia," the population center shifted toward the railhead. The community there was soon named Lynchburg, and the area around this church was renamed South Lynchburg.

There were twenty-one charter members when the congregation was organized--in the Lynchburg Methodist Church sanctuary--and the first minister to serve the church was Rev. W.W. Wilson, a native of County Kerry, Ireland. He also served the Bishopville Presbyterian Church. Rev. T.H. Law, who served as a chaplain in the Confederate Army for the last two years of the Civil War, left the Lynchburg Presbyterian Church without a minister from 1863 to 1865. From the end of the war until 1982 the church was in continuous operation; the congregation was dissolved in 1984.

The church's cemetery, established in the churchyard in the 1850s, was the only cemetery in the vicinity for members of Lynchburg Presbyterian Church, as well as those from the local Methodist and Baptist churches.

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
