Section 8: Period of Significance

The period of significance given is 1910-1967. Based upon communications from the North Dakota SHPO, the date was arrived at due to the fact that the town population peaked in 1960, after which it began to drop dramatically. The date 1967 was chosen to reflect that decline and to exclude a small motel wing added in 1968. Based upon the statement of significance in the nomination regarding the importance of the Hotel Brown in the community, ending the period of significance in 1960 to reflect when the hotel was serving the most people, rather than a more arbitrary date to exclude a later wing. The POS is changed to 1910-1960.

Summary Paragraph

The Hotel Brown, located at 202 Main Street in Flasher, North Dakota, is a two-story craftsman influenced enlarged foursquare, which was built in the summer of 1910 by William H. Brown of WM. H. Brown Land Company and W.F. Berrier. The value of the hotel and furnishings in 1911, was estimated at \$25,000. The actual dimensions are 32' x 120' with an 8' x 24' shed attached to the back (west) side that covers the old coal chute. Gas provided room lighting and heating for the building and an electric bell system was also installed. The original structure had 20 sleeping rooms, a lobby, cloak rooms, writing rooms, and provided dining rooms. Now it has five apartments. Original crown molding and trim, lath and plaster walls, windows, and gas lanterns are found throughout the structure.

Narrative Description

The main structure of this building is wood and has narrow lap wood siding. There are asphalt shingles on the roof, which has four hipped dormers on the north side and four on the south side of the building. Each side dormer has one 1:1 window and the hipped dormer on the west has a pair of 1:1 windows. The front porch on the first and second floor is 9' x 32' with a 19" x 24"

knee wall and has four 18" square pillars for support. The ceilings of the porches are covered with bead board. The upper level porch has a 1:1 window on each side of the double doors that are under a small rectangular transom. An early photograph shows the upper level porches had screens at one time. The lower level porch has concrete steps up to the porch but the wood knee walls have been replaced with wrought iron railing. The double entrance doors are centered on the facade but its transom is covered. There are two large replacement sliding windows to the south and one to the north of the main entrance. A second walk door with a replacement screen door is at the north corner beneath a transom. The window openings in the basement beneath the porch have been covered and the lattice that used to allow light to those windows has been replaced with solid wood.

The one-story north addition, built in 1968 and in line with the main wall of the west façade, was constructed with concrete blocks and has a metal roof. There is a dirt crawl space under this section. This addition originally contained six apartment units but now has two large open sleeping rooms. Access to these apartments was gained through separate outside doors and a side door from the north hall also allows entrance. No windows were altered or removed from the original building at this time.

On the south side of the structure there is a 5' x 32' concrete walkway with stairs to the basement, one door is to the apartment downstairs and one is to the open area of the basement. This walkway is covered with green fiberglass as are all the window wells of the four windows on the south side and two windows on the north side. The two eastern window openings on the south side have paired 1:1 windows, one pair has textured glass, and the other two openings are single 1:1 replacement windows. There is also a sealed metal door from the walkway to the basement. The main level currently has four large 1:1 windows, four smaller 1:1 windows, two large sliding windows at the east and one smaller sliding window at the west end. The eastern sliding windows are replacements that have been framed in to accommodate the shorter height. Two windows from a group of four that was just west of the centerline have been covered but some trim is still visible. The two windows at the west end have been replaced with one sliding window and there is newer siding over the area.

The porches on the west side on the first and second floor are 10' x 10' and have two supporting square pillars on them also. There is a metal escape ladder mounted to the south side of the building. The upper level porch has a walk door with a transom on the south wall while the lower level porch has a walk door on the west end. The ceilings of the porches are covered with bead board.

The west end has one 1:1 window in the upper north corner and the outline of the window that was in the stairway is visible. Inspection of the interior suggests this window may just be covered over. Also on the west end is an L-shaped one-story addition under a shed roof that is used for storage. The walk door is on the south side of the addition with a square window west of it. The L portion also has a square opening covered with plywood on the south side. There are a couple pieces of siding missing from the addition. The north side of the addition has a large wooden door.

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The north side of the hotel has eight 1:1 windows on the upper level while the lower level has six 1:1 windows west of the 1968 addition. A square fixed window is at the west end near the addition.

The full basement under the Hotel Brown is constructed of one foot thick concrete blocks on the north side and the remaining foundation walls are Dakota Sandstone and plaster. The basement did consist of two apartment style rooms and sleeping rooms, furnace area, a hallway, coal chute area, and open spaces but due to water damage a few years ago, it now has open stud walls and exposed concrete and sandstone. A sealed heavy metal door leads to the old coal chute.

The main floor originally consisted of a parlor, bathroom, wash room, writing room, office, lobby, proprietor's bedroom, employee's quarters, and dining room with seven tables having four chairs each. It now consists of a lobby, two bathrooms, parlor, and kitchen with some small rooms off to the side. The lobby picture windows are still the original size but have been replaced with 52" x 58" vinyl sliding windows. The rest of the main floor has the original pulley/weight system windows. The floors are made of old hardwood but are covered with carpet and square tile. The window and door trim is the old decorative crown molding style, and is all the original wood. The ceilings are 9'7" high with a one foot drop ceiling covering the original ceiling.

In the back of the building (west) there is a rounded staircase that goes from the basement to the attic and has a landing on each floor. This staircase is all original wood and has a decorative trim going all the way up from the basement to the attic. The staircase going from the second floor to the attic has an old brass propane lighting rod on the wall that was used for light, a lighting rod is also found in the attic.

The second floor was altered in 1972 from 20 rooms with one main bath, to five apartment style rooms each containing their own bathroom and closet. The hallways were not modified but walls between the rooms were opened up to create the larger spaces. A mechanical room containing a water heater and electrical panels for each room also exists on this floor. The windows on this floor are all the original pulley/weight system windows and ceilings are 9'7" high with a one foot drop ceiling. The apartment entrance doors are the originals and have a small operable wood transom. Throughout the building, including the hallways, paneling is covering the original walls. It appears the paneling also covers original hotel doors although it has not been fully opened to see if all door openings are still extant. The floors on this level are hardwood but are currently covered with carpet.

The attic is an open area with two furnace systems and no floor, only two inch by six inch boards and some insulation with an unfinished ceiling. Behind the attic door is an old brass lighting pipe used with propane for light in the attic. The dormer windows in here are all the original pulley/weight system.

Statement of Significance Summary Paragraph (Provide a summary paragraph that includes level of significance, applicable criteria, justification for the period of significance, and any applicable criteria considerations.)

The Hotel Brown was built and opened in the summer of 1910, by WM. H. Brown Land Company. On October 15th, 1910 the first train ran on the newly constructed Mott line through Flasher. The hotel provided meals in various capacities to townsfolk, travelers and workers until January 1915, when a public cafe and restaurant opened in the Hotel Brown with an unknown name. The Hotel Brown qualifies to be listed in the National Register at the local level under Criterion A in the areas of commerce and social history. With the opening of the Hotel Brown, Main Street of Flasher was moved from the west side of town to its current location.

Narrative Statement of Significance (Provide at least one paragraph for each area of significance.)

In 1902, William H. Brown and the Brown Land Company (which assisted in colonizing much of southwestern North Dakota) founded and plotted the town of Flasher. Flasher was originally named Iowa City by Mr. Brown, but the post office no longer allowed the use of a state's name when naming post offices. He then chose Berrier, after his friend W.F. Berrier, but similar post office names in North Dakota could cause confusion so the name Flasher was selected in 1903, in honor of Miss Mabel Flasher, personal secretary to Mr. Brown and niece of Mrs. Brown. With the arrival of the Northern Pacific Railroad in 1910, Flasher reached "Boom Town" status. Many homes and businesses were built including the Hotel Brown, and many clubs and organizations were established. The Hotel Brown is one of the oldest building still standing in its original location in Flasher, North Dakota. The Hotel Brown has provided rooms for the railroad workers and passengers, Black Hills Trail travelers (which ran right by Flasher), and new settlers coming to seek land to settle.

SOCIAL HISTORY:

In addition to providing rooms, the Hotel Brown was also a social gathering location for local organizations and the public. On October 15, 1910, when the railroad made its first trip between Mandan and Mott, it was a great social event with officials from Minneapolis, St. Paul, Duluth and Fargo, as well as local citizens who all posed in front of the newly constructed Hotel Brown for a picture. A large group of men gathered in front of Hotel Brown on this day in Flasher in preparation for a day of land buying. These men posed with musical instruments at lower left of image. Many of the men wore ribbons on their suit coats, and have tags or tickets tucked into the brims of their hats. Prior to opening up a public restaurant in 1915, the Hotel Brown also provided late evening suppers for group events such as lodge suppers, dance luncheons, in addition to providing meals for hotel patrons. Verda Lawson, a local resident, recalled in a January 2008 letter to the Flasher Historical Society her memories of the hotel as a "nightly gathering place for hotel guests and residents as well as the townspeople" to play cards and tell stories in the 1930s and 1940s. She also indicated on Saturday nights, folks would gather on the

porch and second floor balcony to observe the high school band play on the bandstand located across the street near the doctor's office and post office, to the east of the hotel.

The Hotel Brown became a historical landmark as it still stands in its original location on Main Street. Its ownership changed back and forth between the William H. Brown children and their heirs during the years. In 1933, Lew and Nellie Craigo moved from Mott to Flasher and managed the hotel as the Flasher Hotel until they purchased it from the Brown family in 1943 and at this time changed the name to Craigo Hotel. William and Emilybelle Schmeding (daughter of Lew and Nellie Craigo) took over ownership of the hotel after Mr. Craigo passed away in 1954, and built the six unit motel on the north side of the hotel in 1968.


