DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Built in 1897, the Emporium is a late Victorian rectangular two-story commercial brick building with original living quarters on the second floor and sales room and offices on the first. A second story roofed balcony is distinguished by a series of four symmetrical arches which are repeated on the first floor level. Eastlake finial details on the false front above the balcony and in the second story archwork complete the ornamentation of an otherwise simple structure. A newspaper article writting during September of 1897 indicates that the main sales room on the first story had a "balcony running around on three sides" and that "the front was lighter with plate glass". These features are still in place and the facade including the ground floor retains its original integrity and millwork.

The basement's stone foundation and the back wall are in the process of deterioration but remain original. Also, a rear balcony has been removed. Interior changes are insignificant. The upstairs apartment and dance hall, the original hall stencilling, and redwood wainscotting and molding are in the process of being restored to their 1897 appearance. The building has a new concrete tile roof, one entire side of the encircling roofline parapet has been rebuilt, and three chimneys recapped.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Emporium has both architectural and historical significance in the region. This simple brick two-story commercial building is distinguished by an outstanding facade composed of a two story gallery and false front ornamented with good Eastlake detailing. The facade's double archwork contributes to the structure's design integrity, and the building serves as a focal point along a street of good but less distinguished commercial buildings.

A September 1, 1897 newspaper article in the Mother Lode Magnet documents the new Emporium Building and states that "the new \$10,000 business block erected by J.W. Witney and Sons is with one exception, the Hotel Victoria, beyond question the most imposing business structure in Tuolume County...C.H. Wilson is the architect and builder; C.G. Witman did the tinning and plumbing; the Central Electric Light Company furnished the electrical appliances. Taken in all it is a splendid structure and reflects credit upon the energy and enterprise of the manager, J.W. Witney."

Historically, the Emporium makes an important local contribution to the region's commercial patterns. The building served as a pioneer department store in Tuolumne County and was recognized as dealing in the finest clothing and furnishing goods in the county. J.W. Witney, its original owner, only occupied the building for six months. Moses Areant acquired and managed the business until 1928 when he sold it to Porter and Barendregt who continued the department store until 1969. In addition, between 1906 and 1923 the Emporium served as a telephone station for calls through the county.

Architecturally, the building is an outstanding and rare example of its type and period in Tuolumne County. In remarkably unaltered condition, the building strongly exemplifies commercial architecture in the Mother Lode during the late 19th century. Its facade has unusual design integrity and the building makes a significant visual contribution to the community's setting.
