## PHYSICAL DESCRIPTION

The Power Apartments is a two story double brick massing. Overall the building measures approximately 60 feet in width, 20 feet in depth, and 22 feet in height. The major decorative features are concentrated on the front facade. They include a bracketed cornice with red tiled upper surface and a segmental entry hood with returns which is supported by a pair of pilasters and a pair of columns. Above the entry is a window recess with bracketed wrought iron railings. Flat and round topped windows are also employed in the front facade. A block addition has been made on the east side of the building.

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Built in 1915, the Power Apartments is a well preserved example of Spanish Colonial Revival architecture in Yuma. The building was erected by Mary E. Nugent, daughter of a pioneer Yuma family, after her marriage to the Rev. Stephen Power, an Episocopal minister. At the time it was built, the structure was situated at the southern end of the main commercial district. Since business activity later extended past Third Street the apartments have been incorporated into the fabric of the downtown area. Because of its scale and character the building is a positive contribution to the area while at the same time it retains a singular identity.
