ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION AND PRESENT CONDITION: Late Victorian eclectic residence; two stories tall, rectangular plan, truncated hip roof, one interior chimney, one story porch with solarium on second floor over northern most bay, weatherboard frame construction on modern brick foundation reworked when house was restored, asphalt shingle roof; details include octagonal porch supports with corinthian columns balanced on the facade by fluted pilasters. beveled leaded glass sidelights and fanlight around the front entrance, floor length multipaned French windows, applied carved wood decorations on the ceiling of porch, cornice of porch and roof, and two story projecting bay window on south elevation, roof cornice has (CONT'D)

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE (FROM ORIGINS TO PRESENT): Apparently, this house was built ca. 1890. In the city directory of 1891-1892, George Y. Pond, deputy clerk, U.S. circuit and district courts, is listed at this address, along with Misses Annie and Callie Pond. Members of the Pond Family lived here until around 1902, when Charles M. Kinsel, a local jeweler, and Sophia, his wife, became inhabitants.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (ARCHITECTURAL AND HISTORICAL): Architecture: This house is unique in Columbus because of its extensive carved applied ornament. It and a house almost exactly like it two doors down are the only two structures in the Resource area with a beveled frieze in the cornice. It is an excellent example of the mixed use of architectural styles found toward the end of the 19th century. Local History: This house is significant as it was the home of George Y. Pond, a Deputy Clerk of the U.S. Circuit and District Courts. Due to Pond's position, he built his home in close proximity to the courthouse (directly across the street) so that he might better serve his job.
