DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Gorham Campus Historic District comprises seven architecturally significant buildings. Dating from the early 19th through the early 20th centuries, none of the district's buildings has suffered major alterations. The Campus is located near the junction of State Routes 114 and 25, and has been the site of educational institutions since the Federal period. One of the buildings, the Art Gallery (#2), was individually entered into the National Register on December 27, 1972. All of the buildings in the district belong to the University of Maine at Portland-Gorham and fulfill educational functions. There are no nonconforming intrusions.

Buildings and sites contributing to the character of the district;

- 1. Academy Building: 1807, Federal, 2 stories, clapboarded, hip roof with belfry.
- 2. Art Gallery: 1821, Federal and Greek Revival, 1 story, clapboarded, gable roof, doric colonnaded portico.
- 3. Corthell Hall: 1878, Gothic Revival, 2½ stories, brick, hip roof, 3-story tower on each facade.
- 4. President's Residence: 1906, Queen Anne 2½ stories, brick, hip roof, 1-story facade.
- 5. Robie Hall: 1898, Gothic Revival, $4\frac{1}{2}$ stories, brick, hip roof, polygonal corner towers.
- 6. Andrews Hall: 1916, Gothic Revival, 4½ stories, brick, hip roof.
- 7. Russell Hall: 1931, Tudor Revival, 2 stories with 3-story central tower, brick, flat roof; designed by R. Mayo, built by Googins & Clark, all of Portland, Maine.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Gorham Historic District is important not only for the architectural merit of each of its buildings, but also for the interesting story it illustrates of educational development in Maine.

Incorporated in 1803 by the Massachusetts Legislature and Governor, and endowed by them with unincorporated townships, Gorham Academy opened its doors to 33 men on September 9, 1806. Rev. Reuben Nason acted as the first preceptor in the new Academy building constructed with funds from the sale of some of the townships. The following year the decision was reached to admit women also, as long as the total number of students did not exceed 70. Rev. Thaddeus Pomeroy lead the fund drive in 1835 which raised \$7,000 to build a 3-story Female Seminary dormitory on land he donated for the purpose. The building was completed in 1837, and in 1838, the gorham Female Seminary became a separate school from Gorham Male Academy.

In 1847, the Seminary became known as Gorham Academy and Teachers Institute. Then by an Act of Legislature in August 1850, the whole establishment became the Maine Female Seminary, discontinuing the male portion of what had at one time been a school exclusively for men. The men's Academy was soon reestablished, however, and in 1861, the two institutions reunited as the Gorham Seminary. This Seminary officially closed in 1877, as the proliferation of public high schools had dried up the pool of applicants for private academies.

In 1878, with state support and a \$15,000 appropriation from the town of Gorham, the Western Maine Normal School opened in the old Academy buildings and the new Corthell Hall. The Female Seminary building, after having suffered fire damage twice in 1859, burned down in 1894. A junior high school was built on its site. In 1897, Robie Hall-mamed to honor prominent Gorham citizen Frederick Robie—was dedicated, Robie had served 8 terms as a state representative, six of them as speaker, and had been Governor from 1883-1887.

The Curriculum of the Normal School was expanded in 1911 to include the teaching of industrial arts. In 1925, courses were added in kindergarten and primary teaching. In the late 1920's, a third year was added to the previously two-year program. For the graduating class of 1938, the course became a full four years. The Normal School had its name changed in 1945 to Gorham State Teachers College, becoming the second oldest teachers college in the state. Art and music education were added to the expanding curriculum in the 1950's. The College became accredited in New England in 1960, and nationally in 1964. It is now part of the University of Maine at Portland-Gorham.
