Dayton High School faces southeast onto Ferry Street in a residential neighborhood, seven blocks from the city center. A playing field is to the south, across the street.

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

Dayton High School is a long, one story building which is rectangular in plan. A separate wing houses the stage and gymnasium. It has a concrete foundation and is faced with red brick in a header bond. A gable roof covering the building is partially hidden by the stepped brick parapet on the south facade. The parapet has rowlock and soldier coursing along the cornice. Windows throughout the building are one over one double hung sash; some of the original wooden window sash has been replaced with metal sash. The double entry door on the south facade has three lights and a multipaned transon. Additions to the building are to the north and west.

HISTORICAL DESCRIPTION:

Dayton High School is significant as one of two examples of Art Deco style architecture in the City of Dayton. The building was designed by C.N. Freeman and Company of Portland; construction started in 1935 under the direction of H.G. Setergreen, a building contractor. Built during the Depression, it was constructed as a Public Works Administration Project; the federal government paid \$20,000 toward the \$52,000 cost of the building.

Up until 1937, all Dayton students attended classes in the old school, located between Third and Fourth, Church and Oak streets. It was felt that the crowded classrooms there discouraged students from attending high school. In 1931, the voters passed a measure to organize the Union High School District #4. In the fall of 1937 when the high school opened, 103 students enrolled.

SIGNIFICANCE:

Dayton High School, constructed with PWA funding, is a well-maintained example of Mod- ernistic style of architecture, often used during this decade for government buildings.

The former Dayton Methodist Episcopal Church is on the southwest corner of Fourth and Church Streets. The parsonage on the south side of the church faces Fourth Street. A mature flowering cherry tree is at the entrance of the building; other smaller trees and shrubs have been planted along the southeast side of the church and parsonage. A parking lot for church members is across Fourth Street.

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The former Dayton Methodist Episcopal Church is rectangular in plan with a two story square bell tower and entry attached to its north corner. As originally constructed, it was a Classic Revival church with gable roof having boxed eaves and pedimented gable ends. The front (east) gable is pierced by a lunette. Window openings are straight-topped, fitted with double-hung, one over one sash, and trimmed with architrave molding. The body of the church is clad with narrow, lapped weatherboards. The corner entrance/bell tower is a result of a major remodeling of the church in 1912. Upon its construction initially, its belfry superstructure was castellated and shingle clad (the front gable was clad with shingles at the same time). The belfry has since been enclosed with a pyramidal roof. Historic general views accompanying this nomination document the appearance of the church in its remodeled state after 1912. Notwithstanding the castellated belfry, alterations were in the Colonial Revival style and included residing and addition of the corner entrance/bell tower. Also, the original windows were

replaced at this time with stained glass windows in memory of Dayton's early pioneers. A one story addition at the rear of the church was constructed in 1973 to provide space for offices, kitchen, restrooms, classrooms and a nursery. The parsonage, built in 1912

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HISTORICAL DESCRIPTION:

south of the church, is square in plan, two stories high and two bays wide across the front facade. It has a bellcast hip roof with boxed eaves and one over one double hung sash windows. It has been resided with fire retardant material and is considered to be a non-contributing historic building in its current condition.

The former Dayton Methodist Episcopal Church was the first church built in Dayton. The construction was started in 1860 by Jacob Smith and the building was dedicated by Reverend Kingsley. The cost of the church was \$3,600.00, funds for. which were contributed The by Methodist fellowship. Francis Fletcher, Abraham Coovert, and A.L. Alderman each contributed a generous sum toward the construction of the new building. The parsonage, which is to the south of the church was constructed later, at the time of the major alteration in 1912.

The Evangelican Church purchased the church and property from the Methodists in the early 1940's. In 1946, the Evangelicans merged with the United Brethren Church and changed their name to the Evangelical United Brethren Church. This local congregation repurchased the property in 1968 for \$1,200.00 when another merger took place with the United Methodists.

SIGNIFICANCE: Criteria A and C

Although extensively altered in 1912, the former Dayton Methodist Episcopal Church is significant at the oldest church in Dayton and historic SOURCES: seat of the Methodist Episcopal Church, the first of numerous denominations to establish a permanent church building in the town. It is significant also as an example of Classic Revival architecture updated in the Colonial Revival style. - Dayton Centennial, 1880-1980, Edit. June Bienz, 1980, pp. 28,29.
