Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

7. Description

This three and a half story Renaissance Revival style structure is of red brick and terra cotta. The second story is dominated by alternating triangular and segmental pediments over narrow paired windows. At the third story, round-headed windows are unified by egg-and-dart moldings with foliated keystones and by a continuous horizontal sill. At the attic story, small rectangular windows alternate with decorative molded terra cotta panels. The cornice is supported by consoles with acanthus leaves and is surmounted by a blind balustraded parapet with the name, McAdory Building, in the central panel.

Exterior remodeling, which probably dates from the late 1930's when similar work was done on nearby buildings, is limited to the ground floor. Although not related to the Victorian structure, its use of glass brick, polished facing material and curved entrance are typical of the period. The interior space has been moderately altered, but it retains the original cast-iron support columns and part of a metal ceiling.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The McAdory Building is architecturally significant for the quality of its Victorian Renaissance Revival design in a city not yet 20 years old. The rich and varied composition of the facade and the many classical references, seen in the treatment of the second, third and attic stories and the foliated consoles and anthemion ornament at the cornice lie, indicate the design and craft skills attracted to Birmingham during its first boom (1886-1887). This is one of the finest remaining examples of the city's first period of building sophistication, and its importance is enhanced by being adjacent to a building of similar significance - the Caldwell-Milner Building (1887), which was recently rehabilitated and is being nominated concurrently.

The building is named for C. L. McAdory, a prominent local attorney and businessman who constructed it during the first period of Birmingham's commercial expansion. Located in the heart of the early commercial district, the McAdory Building has housed a variety of mercantile enterprises, including businesses selling boots, shoes, hardware and office supplies.
