Tanglewood is located on the 480-acre tract of land which made up the original plantation and is presently a natural, botanical and wild-

life sanctuary.

The house is a white frame structure raised on brick piers with a gable roof and four end-exterior chimneys. Two windows across the front are double hung with shutters and unadorned wooden lintels. Originally a small portico projected from the central doorway. A small triangular pediment adorned the top of the portico. The portion of the facade behind the portico was faced with shiplapped board which contrasts with the clapboard of the remaining portions of the facade. A small four lite transom adorned the door.

Around 1900 several additions were made to the house. The portico was enlarged, two dormer windows were added to the roof. Originally the house consisted of three rooms downstairs and two upstairs. Bathrooms were also installed in the large halls on both floors.

The house is well-kept up and is furnished with family pieces including several items brought from South Carolina.

The structure was built by Page Harris, who along with his family and several other related or closely associated families left South Carolina in 1817 in search of land to homestead. In 1819 the family reached the present location after spending a year in Tennessee, and began to homestead the land. In the following years the family prospered and adjoining land was homesteaded and added to the original plantation. In 1859 Harris constructed Tanglewood, his permanent home.

At Harris' death the house passed to his daughter Louincy Harris Bishop who in turn left the house to her three children: Gabriel Bishop, Alice Bishop, and J. Nicholene Bishop, for whom the house is being preserved as a memorial.

Miss Bishop, born in 1863, was a noted educator and in her later years wrote two books, <u>Our Settlement</u> and <u>Roadside Flowers</u>. She attended Peabody College in Nashville and later became the first woman to receive the Bachelor of Science from the University of Nashville. For 20 years she taught at Alabama College, now the University of Montevallo and was closely associated with Julia Tutwiler, a prominent Alabama educator and a leader in prison reform. After retiring from Alabama College, Miss Bishop taught in the public schools of Hale County.

In 1949 Mrs. Alma Bishop Williams conveyed Tanglewood to the University of Alabama in memory of her aunt, J. Nicholene Bishop, to be kept in perpetuity as a historic memorial and nature sanctuary.
