DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Red Bank Plantation at the time of its construction was oriented east (front) and west (rear), with the present front being the north side of the house. The building is two full stories high, of brick construction and painted white. With the exception of the two story wood portico which originally graced the front of the house, the simplicity of line, fenestration, roof treatment and floor plan are reflective of early Georgian architecture in the middle colonies. The portico was removed by the Phillips family and the house as it exists today represents several alterations. The Federal style porch with balustrade and raised foundation was added in 1937. Its off-center placement is due to the fact that it is positioned in such a way as to utilize the existing window opening. The lower portion of the addition to the original rear of the house was done in 1937 and the upper room was added in 1948. Both rooms are entered through existing doorways. All windows are six light sash with exterior louvered shutters and lintels above. There is a transom over the main entrance and a screen door has been added.

The house has an abundance of windows. As was the custom in Georgian homes, there are nine windows and a doorway on the front and rear of the house. However, on the end walls which were usually pierced only four times or not at all, there are eight openings. The house is built on heavy hand-hewn timbers and conforms to the four-pen plan on the interior. There is a wide hall running each way creating four square rooms on each floor. The walls are 16 inches thick and each room, exclusive of additions, has a fireplace. The heart pine flooring is original as are many of the glass window panes.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Through the history of Red Bank Plantation can be traced much of the development of South Jacksonville, Florida was a wilderness when Red Banks was born out of a 450-acre Spanish grant. As early as 1793, the land was surveyed by Don Pedro Marrot and filed with the Keeper of the Archives of East Florida under the name Red Banks. At the time of this survey the land was inhabited by one Francis Flora and his family. On November 16, 1799, William Craig, who had gained title to the land from Flora, applied for and obtained a concession from Governor White. In March of 1815, Governor Kindelan gave Craig full and perfect title to the land. During the next 33 years, Red Banks was in the possession of three of Jacksonville's most prominent men. William Craig sold the land to Isaiah C. Hart, one of the founders of Jacksonville and father of Florida's tenth governor. In 1830, Hart sold the land to Issac Hendricks, for whom one of the main avenues in South Jacksonville is named. In 1848 Hendricks' heirs sold the land to Albert Gallatin Phillips, formerly a sheriff of Duval County. It was Phillips who built the house in 1854 of bricks made right on the plantation. The house and land remained in the Phillip's family until after the Civil War when finances made it difficult to keep up the plantation. It was sold to Professor Hiram H. Palmer, Superintendent of Public Instruction for Duval County. In 1924 a real estate company purchased the land and began a sub-division known as Colonial Manor. Red Banks was sold to the T.H. Ellingtons in 1937 with the stipulation that they would purchase the lots to either side of the house and restore the building. At this time most of the alterations in the house were made. The present owners, the Edwin M. Clarkes, purchased it in 1941 and have made only minor alterations.

Since the earliest Spanish surveys there has been a defined area known as Red Banks. For most of its history it has been a working plantation whose owners have played a significant role in the growth of South Jacksonville.
