Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Lewis Jones House faces south on College Corner Road in rural Center Township, one-half mile northeast of Centerville.

Federal in style, the main part of the house is a two and one-half story, common bond brick building with a five-bay facade and a side gable roof. A one and one-half story, gable roof wing extending from the west side of the rear of the main part was originally the kitchen. There is a one and one-half story frame addition, built in 1955 and remodeled in 1974-78, extending from the east side of the rear of the house.

The entrance is located in the central bay of the front facade. It consists of the original four-panel wood door, a four-light transom, and a smooth stone sill and lintel. Windows are double-hung, with 12 lights in each sash. A sash with 12 lights is unusual for this type of house. According to the present owners, the original sash was intact in second-story windows, and restoration of first story windows was based upon those. Windows have stone sills and lintels.

There is an interior chimney, flush with the facade, on each end of the house.

The building has a molded box cornice and beaded frieze. The roof is slate. One slate was found to be dated "1860," suggesting that the roof was recovered in that year.

The end walls of the house are plain except for a small square attic vent on each, and smooth stone returns at the base of the gables.

The interior of the main part is arranged with two rooms over two, the western rooms being larger than the eastern rooms. Original woodwork is in place. There is an original, operable fireplace in each of the four rooms. Cupboards flank the fireplace in the first-story west room. In the first-story east room is an enclosed stairway which is supported by the hip of the fireplace, and which ascends to the bedroom above. A hallway off the rear of the west bedroom in the wing gives access to a staircase which descends to the original kitchen.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Lewis Jones House is significant as a Federal style farmhouse. It is also significant as the house of Lewis Jones who, in April, 1822, made the first mail delivery to Indianapolis.

The house, which has been restored by its present owners, is a good example of an early Center Township farmhouse and of a style that is typical of its time in Wayne County. Wayne County was one of the first counties to be settled in Indiana, and therefore has a concentration of Federal structures that is significant to the state.

Lewis Jones, the original owner and possible builder of the house, came to Center Township in 1814 with his parents. In April, 1822, he made, by way of Cincinnati, the first mail delivery to Indianapolis. The saddlebags he used are housed in a Centerville museum.

Jones was a well-known fruit grower and a founding member of the Wayne County Horticulturist Society, an organization which preceded the State Society by three years.

Jones, who died in 1877, his wife, and several children are buried in Crown Hill Cemetery in Centerville.

The property was later owned by Albert and John Dunbar and families, proprietors of Centerville's early lumber company.
