4/27/84 DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The San Bernardino Main Post Office is an Italianate Beax-Arts inspired structure. The architects made extensive use of cast terracotta ornament, some of which was glazed with bright blue and green. The central arcade on the front elevation was a conventional way of monumentalizing the structure.

### LOCAL CONTEXT

San Bernardino is an incorporated community with a 1982 population of 106,500. When the town was founded in 1841, the economy was based on the citrus industry, which supported the area for almost a century. Urban sprawl came to San Bernardino in the 1950s; today, little architecture from the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries remains.

No archaeologic or paleontologic resources are known to exist within or adjacent to the subject property. Subsurface investigation or additional research do not appear to be justified.

The site was previously occupied by four wood frame houses, with a total interior area of roughly six thousand square feet.

### PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The building has two stories and a full basement. It is constructed of reinforced poured concrete and is topped with a red tile roof. Specific features of note include:

- Acanthus leaf pattern terracotta tile capitals and voussoirs on intrados of arches on front arcade;
- <sup>o</sup> Seven-bayed groin-vaulted entrance vestibule;
- <sup>o</sup> Second-floor balcony with wrought iron railing.

The surrounding land uses are primarily commerical; the post office is three blocks northeast of the San Bernardino Civic Center.

The portion of the roof facing the main elevation is pitched, and covered with red terracotta tiles. The workroom is covered with a flat asphalt composition roof. A dentil molding expresses the interior second-floor lines. The rigid symmetry of the facade indicates the structure's Beaux-Arts parentage, though the detailing and roof treatment give it a Mediterranean/Italianate feeling.

The lobby has plaster walls and a gray and white marble wainscoting, and the workroom retains its hardwood floor.

### ALTERATIONS

The building is in excellent structural condition and is well maintained. The only modification visible from the exterior is the replacement of the original wooden doors with aluminum frame glass doors. The lobby has been extensively remodeled. The orginial lockboxes and service counter have been removed, and bays of new lockboxes have been installed. A metal and glass partition separates the lockboxes and self-service area from the new service counters.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This building is a good example of the federal building program in the 1930s, which resulted from a simple acceleration of the Keyes-Elliot Act of 1926. The building is a locally important example of early twentieth century architecture, in a town with few surviving buildings dating before 1950.

### ARCHITECTURE

The San Bernardino Downtown Station is a stylistically ambiguous blending of Mediterranean and Renaissance Revival ornamental motifs, applied to a classical box. The second story federal offices have access to a large veranda, which is currently unused. This building is actually on the margin between the small-scale combined federal building/post office, and the large buildings constructed in Los Angeles and San Francisco; and the structure is less monumental than the urban post office/courthouse building type in both size and scale. The building is one of a very few which have survived from the first half of this century in San Bernardino, and it therefore contributes to the continuity of the urban fabric more than it would in a town with a more active preservation movement. Its local significance is increased due to the paucity of surviving buildings from the 1930s and earlier in San Bernardino. The building has retained substantial integrity of location, design, materials, and workmanship, and the alterations to the public lobby have not significantly impaired the integrity of the interior spaces.
