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

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The Atantano Shrine is located southeast of route 1 (Marine Drive) and c. 50 meters (m) north of the Atantano river on the Apra Harbor USGS 1:24,000 Quadrangle map (1968). The shrine is accessed by a dirt road branching from route 1 c.0.15 miles north of the junction of routes 1 and 2A. The dirt road rejoins route 1 c. 0.2 miles to the north. The shrine is located near the midpoint of the road, c. 10 meters to the east in a cleared field.

The shrine is a roughly pyramidal monument on a square base, 1.6 m on a side. The shrine stands 2.5 m high and is topped by a wooden cross. The monument appears to have been built in two, or three, successive stages. The uppermost portion appears to be a separate unit. The middle and lower portions appear to be later constructions which successively served as new bases on which the upper monument, and the combined middle and upper monuments, subsequently were repositioned. The actual construction detail and materials are difficult to discerne because the monument has subsequently been painted.

Dedications are inscribed in three panels. Two are didicated to governors from the Spanish Period (A.D. 1521-1898), and the third to a governor from the First American Period (A.D. 1898-1941). The earlist (and uppermost) inscription is written in Spanish and dedicated to Governor Don Felipe Cerain who administered Guam and the Mariana Islands from 1776-1786. The dedication reads:

D. FELIPE CERAIN (G.E.D.) HIZO CONSTRUIR ESTA DIFICIL CALZADO ANOS 1784 Y 1785 PLANTO LOS COCALES E COMNNI DAD Y PRODIÇQ YNNUMERABLES BENEFICIOS A ESTAS YSLAS RUEÇ A DIOS POR SUALMA.

Translated, the inscription reads:

The Governor Don Felipe Cerain, R.I.P., had this difficult road constructed in 1784 and 1785, planted the coconut trees of the community, and brought innumerable benefits to these islands. Pray to God for his soul.

The second inscription, also written in Spanish, is dedicated to the efforts of Governor Don Francisco Villalobos (governed 1831 to 1837). The inscription reads:

DE RIVERA Y D. LUCAS DE CASTRO. Y TODOS LOS CAVEZAS DE
BARABGAY DE AGANA QUE CON EL AUSILIO DE SUS VECINOS LA
GRARON DESDE EL GNO 1832 A 1834 ESTABLECER LAS PRIMERAS SIEMBRAS
DE PALAY EN ESTE FERTIL VEGA, SUPLICAN AGRADECIDOS LA PROTECCION
DE LA VIRGEN MADRE DE DIOS, Y A HONOR DETAN SABERANA REYNA
DESCAN SE NOMBRE ENADELANTES CENEÇ DE LA PURISIMA.

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The translated inscription reads:

The Governor Don Francisco Villabos, the Commissioners Don Antonio Guerrero, Don Juan de Rivera, and Don Lucas de Castro, and all district leaders of Agana, with the help of their fellow citizens succeeded from 1832 to 1834 in establishing the first rice fields in this fertile meadow. They gratefully entreat the protection of the Virgin Mother of God, and in honor of the Sovereign Queen the wish to make its name Swamp of the Immaculate Virgen [sic].

The third inscription is written in English and dedicates the rebuilding of the coastal road connecting the villages of Agat and Piti under the administration of Governor Edward J. Dorn(governed 1907 to 1910). The inscription reads:

PITI-AGAT ROAD REBUILT 1908 1909

CAPT. E.J. DORN USN GOVERNOR IN CHARGE OF WORK

LT. COMDR. E.L. BISSET USN 08 ACE R.M. WARFIELD USN 09

In 1952, an open structure was erected by the 103 Naval Construction Battalion to shelter the shrine. The shelter is dedicated to the 5th Naval Construction Brigade. The shelter consists of four concrete posts arrayed in a square, 12 feet on center, that support a concrete roof. Between the northeast and southeast posts is a wall constructed of cemented coral rocks. The wall is constructed around a natural limestone overhang, the bottom portion of the wall blocks access to the space sheltered by the overhang. A short, wing wall extends from the northeast post at a 65 degree angle from the rear wall. On the side of the wing wall facing the shrine are the words "Biba [Hurrah] SANTA CRUZ Biba!" Followed by translations of the panels written in Spanish. A 12 inch high wall extends from the end of the wing wall to the northwest post, from the northwest post to the southwest post, and the from the southwest post to the southeast post. The low wall is cut by three steps centered between the northwest and southwest posts. A plaque imbedded in the wall reads: "This shelter erected to commemorate the work of the 5th Naval Construction Brigade, 1944-45. 103 NCB 1952."

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The practice of commemorating important achievements of high level administrators has been a long standing tradition of Spanish culture. This tradition was brought to Guam by Spaniards sent to live and work on the island during the Spanish Period (c. AD 1521-1898). The Atantano Shrine is an example of this tradition.

The earlist event commemorated is the construction of a reliable road connecting the villages of Agat and Piti under the direction of Spanish Governor Don Felipe Cerain in 1784-1785. The road furthered interaction between northern and southern Chamoru communities. The next event commemorated was the establishment of rice fields by Governor Villalobos in the low-lying areas around the shrine in 1832-1834. This was part of a plan on the part of the Governor to increase production of staples to reduce imports and keep much needed hard currency on island.

The final event commemorated was the building of the Agat-Piti road under the supervision of Governor Edward J. Dorn in 1808-1909. This commemoration, honoring an American citizen, upholds an continues the tradition begun by the Spanish. In 1952, U.S. Seabees erected a shelter over the shrine to protect it from the elements. The Shelter also honored the efforts of war-time Seabees to rebuild and improve the Agat-Piti road, now known as Marine Drive in honor of the U.S. Marines who participated in the recapture of Guam from the Japanese. The shelter is an integral component of the property.

The events commemorated by the Atanotano Shrine property are significant under Criterion A in that they represent significant events in the broad pattern of Guam's history. Further, because the practice of erecting markers by the Spanish for events such as described above is so common and long lived as to have become tradition, the property has traditional cultural significance as outlined in the National Park Service Bulletin 38.

The site has attained historical importance as a religious site as described under Criteria Consideration A. Today, an annual fiesta (a local traditional cultural event of religious adoration focused on a Catholic Saint or sacred religious artifacts) is held at the site of the shrine. The festivities last for nine days, and focus on the cross that is mounted on the apex of the shrine nad dedication the Virgin Mother of God. The mayor of Piti asserts this practice originated at least before World War II.

The site also gained historical significance as described under Criteria Consideration F. The continuing use and maintenance of the shrine attests to the symbolic importance of the shrine to local people. These activities serve to keep alive the local knowledge of the events commemorated by the shrine, further the traditional cultural function of the shrine as envisioned by its originators, and provide continuity into modern times.

Few cultural remains of sufficient integrity to provide tangible connections to

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the Spanish Period exists on Guam. The Atantano Shrine provides not only a link to the earlist historic times, but does so with continuity through the intervening historic periods.

On June 5, 1975, the Atantano Shrine was listed on the Guam Register of Historic Places. On September 18, 1989, International Investments Inc., made a gift and dedication of the land (Lot 230-2) to the Government of Guam Department of Parks and Recreation.


