DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Ruth Ann Dodge Memorial is the work of sculptor Daniel Chester French and architect **Henry** Bacon. It is situated on a knoll adjacent to Fairview Cemetery in Council Bluffs, which affords a good view of the city.

The memorial consists of a statue of an angel, wreathed with laurel and holding a shallow basin of water on her right arm. The statue is cast bronze, 3/4" thick. It is about  $8\frac{1}{2}$ feet high, and 5 feet 8 inches at greatest width. The pedestal is pink marble, cut to suggest a ship's prow, and garlanded with swags. It rises out of a semicir cular reflecting pool, the floor of which is inlaid with earth-toned pebbles. The pool is ringed with three low marble "steps", the uppermost of which serves as the pool's edge. The pedestal is backed with a low marble platform, about 2 feet high, that forms benches on either side of the statue, and which has memorial inscriptions chiseled in the faces over the pool. The corner blocks of the platform are decorated with wreaths in basrelief.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Ruth Anne Dodge Memorial is Iowa's only work by Daniel Chester French, a sculptor most popularly known for the Lincoln statue (Lincoln memorial, Washington), the Minuteman (North Bridge, Concord) and John Harvard (Cambridge). After Augustus Saint-Gaudens, French was perhaps the most prominent American sculptor of the late 19th and early 20th centuries, but his works (from 1869 to 1924) were concentrated largely on the east coast. Exceptions included works in Chicago (especially for the 1893 exposition), Minneapolis/St. Paul, Kansas City and Omaha.

The work was commissioned in late 1916, by Anne Dodge and Ella Dodge Pusey, for their late mother, Ruth Anne Dodge, whose husband was railroad magnate Grenville M. Dodge. The idea for the statue (an angel holding a basin of water) originated in a recurrent dream that came to Ruth Anne Dodge shortly before she died of cancer September 4, 1916. In the dream, an angel approached her with a bowl of water, urging the sick woman to drink. In the third occurrence, Mrs. Dodge dreamed that she did drink; she died shortly thereafter. Her daughters were much impressed by the story, leading them to plan a memorial on the theme.


Since the Dodges maintained a residence in New York as well as in Council Bluffs, the sisters' selection of Daniel Chester French to execute their mother's memorial was not unexpected, as they probably had seen examples of French's work in eastern cities. According to French's account book, first payment for the sculpture was made 18 December, 1916. The memorial was finished in 1918, water in the fountain and pool turned on in May, 1969. There was a private dedication ceremony, the date of which has not been fully established, although in later years Anne Dodge recalled it as March, 1920.

Over the years the memorial has suffered neglect, the water system is no longer in use, and the originally landscaped area has become overgrown; the statue has also been subject to vandalism. The Director of the Grenville M. Dodge house has proposed moving the memorial to the Dodge House grounds, in order to protect it from further defacement.

### Verbal Boundary Description

That portion of Lots 1, 2, and 3 of Thomas Elder's Addition to the City of Council Bluffs, Iowa more particularly described as follows: Commencing at the Southwest corner of Lot 3 in said addition thence easterly along the southerly line of said Lot 3 a distance of 166.1 feet thence northwesterly a distance of 124.55 feet along a line forming an interior angle of 84°26' with the southerly line of said Lot 3; thence westerly a distance of 157 feet along a line having an interior angle with the second described line of 105°46'; thence southerly along the easterly side of North Second St. in the City of Council Bluffs, Iowa distance of 153.5 feet on a line having an interior angle with the third described line of 79°42' or to the point of beginning. (Such fourth line also forming an interior angle of 90°6' with the first line described above.)
