Constructed in 1876 as a refuge station for shipwreck victims, the house at Gilbert's Bar, as originally constructed, was a two-story wood frame structure erected on pilings. exterior was covered with clapboard which has since been covered over with shingles but remains intact beneath. house has a gable-on-hip roof topped with a subsidiary structure originating at the ridge and running nearly the full width of the roof on both sides. This structure contains twelve small, outward opening, hinged-at-the-top windows all set beneath a common roof with wide eaves and brackets. is a small casement window in each of the end gables and fenestration on the east and west sides of the ground floor is regular with sash windows being the type employed. veranda crosses the west front of the house and returns back across the south side. The veranda originally had slender square supporting posts, bracketed at the top. In addition, the treatment of the balustrade area was unusual in that one horizontal wooden stretcher with brackets replaced the traditional spindled balustrade. In recent years the south and west sides of the porch have been enclosed with screen and the brackets are now gone.

On the interior of the building, floors are of pine. There are three large rooms on the first floor which were originally used as office space, eating facilities, etc. The upstairs provided sleeping space for the shipwreck victims. The building is now used as a small museum of local maritime history and it remains in an excellent state of repair although there have been minor changes to the exterior.

There are, today, several other buildings within the refuge complex—a lookout tower of wooden construction, water storage tanks and a concrete block storage building. Although it is certain that there were originally some dependencies associated with the House of Refuge, these are not the original structures.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

During a hurricane which affected the southeast Florida coast in October, 1873, the crew of a vessel wrecked by the storm reached the shore only to find no aid was available to them there. This situation was brought to the attention of the federal government, and shortly thereafter, the Superintendant of the U. S. Life Saving Service ordered the construction of five "houses of refuge" on the east coast of Florida. By an act of Congress passed in June, 1874, the recommended refuge stations were established; eventually, a total of ten houses of refuge were built. spaced at intervals along the east Florida coast so that shipwreck victims who reached the shore could walk to one of them and receive assistance. No rescue services were provided, but the houses of refuge gave aid, food, and shelter to those who made their way to them. A stock of salted and dried foods, clothing, medicine and books was maintained at each house of refuge for use by the shipwreck victims. house contained downstairs living quarters for the keeper and his family and a single large room upstairs which served as a sort of dormitory for those who sought refuge there.

The Gilbert's Bar House of Refuge, as it is commonly known, was authorized by the above mentioned act of the U.S. Congress in June, 1874. A contract for the construction of two refuge stations then established was awarded to Albert Blaisdale on October 18, 1875; one of these was Station Number Two to be located at "St. Lucie Rocks." presented a bill for the construction of that house of refuge shortly before April 6, 1876, by which time the building was presumably completed. The first keeper, Fred Whitehead, was appointed for a term commencing on December 1, 1876. Gilbert's Bar House of Refuge at St. Lucie Rocks continued to serve as an aid station for shipwreck victims until December 31, 1940, on which date it ceased to function in that capacity. World War II, the facility was used as a submarine patrol base manned by the Coast Guard. Later, ownership of this station passed to the Martin County Historical Society (in 1955) and then to the Martin County Commissioners, who created the House of Refuge as a museum in the fall of 1969.
