

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#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Royland (1908) is a large Colonial Revival house located in an old residential section of Marksville. It is set well back with trees which flank a grand approach. It has suffered little loss of integrity (as described below).

The frame two-story structure has a central hall, double parlor plan and a rear kitchen wing. Originally the central hall was intended by the architects to merge with a front parlor to create one large ballroom space. However, during construction the two spaces were divided by a wall. The reason for this change is unknown.

The main block of the house is incorporated into a massive three-bay Ionic temple form with heavy modillion cornices and a lunette inscribed in the tympanum. The upper hall terminates in a balcony which surmounts the squat pedimented doorway.

The interiors are spacious but plain with standard catalog ordered mantels, doors, and wainscotting.

It appears that the south side of the upper rear gallery was always glazed in.

Since construction there have been two minor changes in the house:

- (1) The front facade clapboards have been replaced.
- (2) Louvered shutters have been installed on most of the windows.

#### Assessment of Integrity:

The house is mainly significant because of its monumental size and its tremendous portico. Neither of these have been affected by the aforementioned changes.

Criterion C

Royland is locally significant in the area of architecture as a monument in the turn-of-the-century residential architecture of central Louisiana. In all likelihood it is the only example of a Colonial Revival residence in the region with a "full blown" classical temple form. It has a remarkable degree of classical purity given the date of construction.

In examining the legacy of the Colonial Revival influence in central Louisiana, one finds mainly asymmetrical Queen Anne houses with turrets, semioctagonal bays, verandas, and Colonial Revival details such as Doric columns and an occasional Palladian window motif. Essentially the Colonial Revival replaced the Eastlake style as the primary source of embellishments for Queen Anne houses and cottages.

In contrast to this, Royland's design shows a complete assimilation and understanding of the Colonial Revival as it had developed in America's eastern urban centers. By 1905 the "high style" Colonial Revival had developed into almost a neo-Georgian style. This can be seen at Royland in the symmetrical facade, the colossal pedimented portico, the heavy modillion cornice, and the frontal lunette. There are few other examples in central Louisiana which show this degree of "high style" sophistication.


Because Royland is regionally significant within the state, it is being nominated for significance at the local level.
