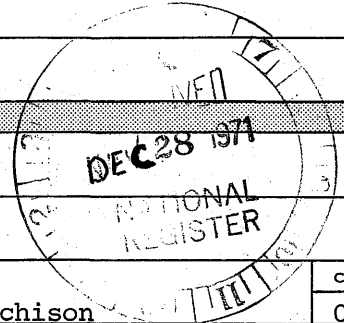

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE.

The Edgar Watson Howe Home is a two-story red brick structure rising from a native stone foundation. The brick is laid in common running bond and the stone in random ashlar pattern. The house is irregular in plan with a two-story octagonal tower projecting from the north side and a three-story octagonal tower on the south. A large porch with brick pillars spans the entire east front. An iron railing encloses the space between the pillars. The shingled hip roof has dormer windows, and there are miniature spires at each end of the ridges. The roof overhangs the brick wall below and is supported by decorative brackets. Coupled brackets are used at the corners. Windows on both floors are of the double hung type and are rectangular in shape. The windows rise from stone sills and are capped with curved stone lintels. The lintels have simple designs except for those on the east facade, which are ornamented with carvings and a keystone. A small frame outbuilding located to the rear of the house is similar in character to the main house. The exterior of the Edgar W. Howe Home is believed to be little changed. However the interior has been considerably altered as the building has been used as an apartment house. The main house is a good example of the Renaissance style of architecture in Kansas.

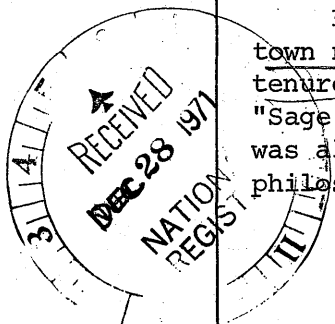
STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Edgar Watson Howe Home at 1117 North Third street in Atchison was built in the early 1880's for the well-known Kansas newspaper editor and his family. The Howes had moved to Atchison in 1877, where he established the Daily Globe even though the city already had three newspapers. He distributed free copies of the Daily Globe for the first two weeks and after that had no difficulty getting subscribers. The personality which Howe injected into the Globe and his concern with people rather than things soon made his publication a success, and eventually all other Atchison newspapers went out of business.

As his newspaper achieved financial success, Howe made plans to move his family from their small house on Santa Fe street. He purchased land on what was then known as the old Doniphan road; at that time the site was out in the country. The house erected for him was said to have been patterned after one in the neighborhood which he knew and admired. Although there is some question about the specific date the house was completed, an 1882-1883 Atchison city directory lists the Howe family residence as 1117 North Third street. Later a small one-room frame house was built beside the larger house, and after his wife divorced him in 1901, Howe lived and wrote there for several years before returning to the main house. After he retired as a newspaper editor in 1910, he built a bungalow three and one-half miles south of Atchison overlooking the Missouri river. At "Potato Hill" as his retirement home was called, he began publishing a magazine, the E. W. Howe Monthly. The town house was left almost entirely as it was, and Howe continued to live there during part of the year. After his death in 1937, Howe's niece resided in the Atchison house. The building was later made into apartments, but the present owners reportedly plan to restore it to its original appearance.

Edgar Watson Howe has often been referred to as the best small-town newspaper reporter in the nation, and the Globe during his tenure was one of the most widely quoted papers in America. The "Sage of Potato Hill," as he became known in his retirement years, was also a successful author of many articles and books in which his philosophy on life and religion was expressed. His most famous book,
